Chief's Report By Fire Chief Freitag

This month has gone by quickly with multiple trips to Phoenix for meetings and to testify in committee on a number of fire service supported bills as well as one that we opposed. H2151 is a clean-up bill related to Authorities. It passed out of the House on February 5th by unanimous vote and has now moved to the Senate. The fingerprint clean-up bill, H2152 has passed out of the House and is ready for the Senate. Its mirror bill, S1114, should be out of the Senate shortly. Both are expected to pass without issue and be signed by the Governor. H2180 related to Fire District Budget Hearings has passed unanimously out of the House and is moving to the Senate. This bill changes the statute back to allow a Fire District to do a mid-year budget adjustment utilizing the same process as setting the annual budget.

A bill that would have limited a property owner's ability to seek annexation by utilizing state/federal lands to create a contiguous boundary has been pulled, H2344. This bill was proposed by Rural Metro, a subsidiary of AMR, and would have had negative implications statewide. S1153 would have stripped or severely limited the life safety code as it relates to fire flow requirements and would have shifted the cost burden from the for profit developers to the city, town, county or fire district. We appreciate Senator Allen's willingness to listen to our concerns and pull the bill.

The request for proposal (RFP) for an IT audit we discussed several months ago has been issued. Because we do not have the expertise to write something like this, we used an outside third party to assist in drafting the document and utilized a template from another governmental entity. This took us quite a bit longer than we had hoped, but we felt it vital that the RFP was complete and accurate. Additionally, we are now undergoing some divisional changes in Technical Services. These changes will leave us shorthanded for a while; however, I have complete faith and confidence in Tony, Dave and Michael to carry us through.

Director Wasowicz and I met with Mr. Kuknyo related to his questions about PSPRS. The meeting lasted 1.5 hours, and I believe we were able to answer all of his questions. As we explained during the meeting, we're happy to sit and talk with him, but it's not possible for us to spend the time needed during a Board meeting to answer the questions he has.

I was asked to participate in a new mentor program at Glassford Hill Middle School. For the pilot, five men and five women from the community were chosen that the school felt serve as community leaders and role models. By the time of the Board meeting I will have met with my seventh grade mentee three times during his school day.

I've been asked by Director Whitney, Division of Forestry and Fire Management (DFFM), to attend the Governor's annual pre-season briefing along with a few other fire chiefs. I will be at the Capitol on the 22^{nd} to show support for DFFM as well as the Governor's budget which includes a significant increase for mitigation efforts. Even with the recent rains, we remain in a significant drought zone. Conditions indicate this year could be worse than 2002 and 2011.

I have the privilege of mentoring under retired Fire Chief Mike Cason to take over his role as a facilitator of the New Fire Chief's Seminar held at Summer Fire School. It is an honor and privilege to work with this group of peers and become a more integral part of the program.

We continue to meet with labor to discuss wages and benefits. Our conversations are going well as we discuss appropriate ways to work through concerns.

Administration By Assistant Chief Tharp

We have received notification from the Yavapai County Attorney that the Transwestern Pipeline Company has not only filed a tax appeal for tax year 2016, but also 2017 and 2018. If this follows suit from the prior tax appeal by Transwestern, this would result in a specific reduction in centrally assessed value to the Central Yavapai Fire District and would require a refund of revenue back to the Yavapai County Treasurer's office for those taxes collected. There was no impact to the Chino Valley Fire District as the pipeline did not go through their boundaries. The last time that this occurred (for tax years 2010-2013), the refund was \$46,568.37. And going forward, the reduction in centrally assessed value was \$474,739. If the new appeal is upheld, the refund could even be more. We will keep board members apprised of this process.

As we continue with the budget process, we received the preliminary increase to our health insurance. The health insurance risk pool that we participate in used to be a few dozen municipal, school and fire districts. However, in July of 2017, the Arizona Public Employers Health Pool joined into Kairos. This health insurance pool is much larger and has multiple "self-funded" as well as individual risk pool members. The advantage, as we have explained, is that risk is spread out amongst multiple organizations which help to mitigate costs while providing a more "tailored" plan design to its participants. In the first six months of the Kairos health pool, there were just over \$24,000,000 in claims and expenses, but this is right in line with the anticipated \$50,000,000 in claims and expenses that were budgeted. We are actually seeing a trend of larger claims (over \$50,000 each) slowly coming down – which is good because 40% of all claims are usually incurred by these types of larger claims...and less than 1% of the entire participants covered. The budgeted increase for the 2018-2019 fiscal year will be 4% and this is based on not only claims history and anticipated membership, but also is analyzed by an actuarial study that looks at market industry trends in medical procedure costs, prescription costs, health of the membership, etc. The averages of the private insurance increases for 2017 were up 25% and anticipated increases for Arizona are 6% for 2018. Kairos is staying below market trends and there will be no increase for 2018 for their dental insurance. Again, the Central Arizona Fire and Medical Authority is about looking for and implementing programs and processes that will control or reduce costs for overall benefit to our internal and external customers.

Finally, I want to thank all the Finance, Administrative, and Human Resource staff for their efforts during our latest audits and promotional testing. We have an outstanding staff that is dedicated to providing professional and accurate services to our employees and outside organizations. We often receive compliments for their tireless efforts by both internal and external customers. I know that our organization could not be as successful if not for their dedication and hard work.

Monthly Safety Tip

Even though it's February, the lack of rainfall and snow has vegetation very dry. Use caution when cutting, welding, or grinding anywhere near grasses, brush, or weeds.

Be careful when towing and make sure chains are not dragging on the ground.

Be aware when parking your vehicle on the side of the road. A hot muffler or catalytic converter can start a fire in the dry grass and brush.

Use extreme caution when open burning. Follow the rules on the burn permit and make sure to activate your permit prior to burning.

Place fireplace and woodstove ashes away from any structure or dry vegetation. Place ashes in a metal canister and soak well with water before disposing.

Operations By Assistant Chief Polacek

The month of February brings us two grant deadlines that we met. The Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) is a federal grant that we submitted February 2nd. We requested \$1,000,000 for new self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA's). The total cost to replace all of our SCBA's, spare bottles, and rapid intervention crew (RIC) bottles is around \$1,225,000. The grant requires a 10% match from the department. Our cost, if we receive the grant, will be \$204,000. The grant will not cover the RIC bottles so that additional \$21,000 will also have to come out of our capital reserve account. We requested the SCBA's, because our bottles are nearing their 15-year life expectancy, and will need to be replaced. Our SCBA's are 2002 and 2007 NFPA Standard compliant; we requested packs that meet the 2018 NFPA Standard. As we know technology has changed a lot since 2002, and the new SCBA's offer improved firefighter safety with a built-in locating device as well as better communications. We will have another year to apply for the grant before we would need to replace all of the outdated SCBA's and bottles.

We also submitted a Homeland Security Grant for personnel protective clothing for an active shooter event; previous submittals have not been successful. We are asking for \$30,000 to purchase ballistic helmets and ballistic vests so our personnel can be protected in the event of an active shooter incident. As we have seen in Las Vegas, fire personnel are going into scenes to rescue people when there may still be a threat. We hope this never happens in our town, but we want to be prepared if it does.

With the dry winter conditions, we received an order from the State to deploy a Type 6 engine to the Bagdad area for a two acre wildland fire. Our crews worked on this incident for two days, because there were limited resources to respond. We have also seen several small wildland fire incidents within our district. This year we have seen that wildland season is not just the summer months, but all year long.

The Tri Tech CAD system is rolling out on February 13th. The crews have been trained, the system has been tested, and now the system is up and running. We will have some issues to work out as we cannot test every aspect of the system, but overall the system is a vast improvement from the outdated ADSI CAD program we have been using.

We had our PRCC Chief's meeting, and I have submitted the PRCC year-end report for you to review as well as the draft budget. Because the PRCC budget is still in draft form, it is not for the public to view at this time.

We continue to see our personnel affected by the flu. Though we offer flu shots to our personnel, this year's vaccine was not the correct one for the flu that has been going around. We have been seeing multiple sick leave callouts from our personnel daily. We want to remind everyone to wash their hands, and if you are sick stay home; please don't spread your cold to others.

Planning and Logistics By Assistant Chief Bliss

We received the net assessed valuations (NAV's) to be used in the 2018-2019 budget. Both Districts received higher values than my conservative forecast and also slightly higher than I was hoping for. Chief Tharp and I have recently requested a data breakdown from the County Assessor's office that separates increases in existing structures from increases due to new construction. Based on the numbers as a whole, it appears that this year's increases contained healthy new construction values for both Districts. And, based on information from the municipalities that we cover, the growth should continue into next year. We will also be developing a process to track our NAV's against the full cash value. The expectation is that there will be a widening difference between the two as we get further from the Prop 117 implementation. This difference may provide a buffer to fire districts in the event of future real estate downturns.

Fleet Maintenance took delivery of the two new Type 1 engines and work has begun on getting them ready for service. This work includes personnel from Fleet, Technical Services, and the Warehouse as well as assistance from some Operations personnel. Fleet Services Manager Scaife and several other personnel will be going back to South Dakota soon to inspect the ladder company and Type 3.

Training By Training Chief Feddema

We have concluded the January/February quarterly training that focused on search and rescue techniques. These are techniques that will hopefully provide crews the skills to better protect themselves and their crew during a structure fire. Part of the training included crawling through a maze of entanglements with their mask blacked-out. Throughout the maze there are several obstacles that force them into a confined space, and they complete the drill by removing a victim. The training has gone very well, and we are now preparing for the next session in March/April which will focus on wildland fires.

Training continues to increase with multiple classes that are occurring in February. These classes include a Paramedic Refresher, S-219 Firing Operations, and the S-212 Wildland Fire Chain Saws. These courses are taught by our personnel and are offered to outside agencies. Firefighter Dan McCarty taught the two wildland courses and did an excellent job. The Paramedic Refresher has attracted paramedics from around the tri-city area and was filled to capacity within the first several weeks it was offered. With outside students attending the course, it helps cover the cost of instruction.

The HazMat course was completed on February 9th with five CAFMA personnel graduating. This course was 5 weeks long and included a variety of information associated with hazardous materials incidents. Our new firefighters will also begin their academy soon, and we are finalizing the details to ensure quality training. Captain Parra has done a great job refining the curriculum we use during the academy, and we have provided our lesson plans and calendar to other agencies who have requested it as an example. The official graduation will be held at CARTA on April 26.











Fire Calls For Service by Month - CY 2017





He explained that we are half way through the year and the budget is at 46% which is on track. There is a PRCC Chief's meeting this Thursday, and the new system will be rolled out in February.

Chief Freitag stated that Director Dobbs has been meeting with labor and everything is fine.

- 5. CORRESPONDENCE
 - A. Letters from the Public

Chief Freitag mentioned that all public correspondence is submitted to the Board and expressed appreciation for the handwritten notes.

B. Monthly Division Reports from the Fire Chief and staff in regard to current activities of the Fire Authority and the status and progress relating thereto

Chief Freitag informed the Board that there was a motor home fire this morning in Paulden in which one person died and another person was flown with life threatening injuries.

Chief Tharp informed the Board that members are working through the budget process with a zero-base budget; therefore, they are providing recommendations and justifications for all accounts. The budget will be developed, and a joint meeting will be scheduled for Board input.

Fire Marshal Chase provided an update regarding Emmanuel Pines Camp located at 3000 Spence Springs Road and community members' concerns. He explained that the original buildings were constructed in 1950 and additional buildings were added through 1998. There were public concerns raised in March 2016 regarding the possibility of the camp being turned into a rehab facility and limited fire access due to the narrow road. Yavapai County Community Development Director Steve Mauk and Fire Marshal Chase visited the facility in July 2016 in addition to fire agency personnel performing annual camp inspections in May of 2016 and 2017 with no evidence of a change in occupancy. It was also confirmed with the camp owner that there is no intention to change occupancy type. Fire Marshal Chase stated that if the camp changes use or occupancy type, the current fire codes would need to be met including a minimum 20' wide fire access road. The private road varies from 16' to 20' and is not maintained by the County. Fire Marshal Chase stated that residents have a high concern for safety due to the road not being consistently 20' wide, and suggested a viable solution would be that residents along Spence Springs Road allow for a portion of their easement to be used to maintain the 20' wide road.

Chief Freitag explained that Chief Bliss is assisting Bullhead Fire with a hiring process and did not leave anything additional.

Chief Feddema stated that he is developing the 2018 Engineer's Academy, and he recently had the opportunity to meet with members of other agencies within the state to help improve training statewide.

6. NEW BUSINESS

A. Year End June 30, 2017 Audit - Presentation by HintonBurdick CPAs & Advisors and

Steve Palmer with HintonBurdick CPAs and Advisors presented the June 30, 2017 Year End Audit report to the Board.

Steve Palmer representative with HintonBurdick CPAs & Advisors presented the June 30, 2017 Year End Audit report. He explained that they issue an independent auditor's report which is an opinion on whether the financial statements present the financial position of the Agency fairly. He stated that they issued a clean opinion. He also stated that there were no issues noted regarding internal financial controls. He provided a brief overview of the financials for CAFMA's first year. Mr. Palmer expressed his appreciation of management's assistance and stated that they are doing a great job in keeping accurate records.

Chair Pettit stated that at this time there will be no changes.

B. Discussion and Possible Approval of Amended Policy 190 Public Records Access and New Job Descriptions for Facilities Maintenance Technician I and Facilities Maintenance Technician II and the Corresponding Wage Scales

Chair Pettit asked Attorney Cornelius to review Policy 190 Public Records Access and clarify the language.

Chair Pettit stated that the weekly review that the Chief Freitag writes is very valuable both internally and externally and the Board would like it distributed at large. She mentioned that an email distribution list will be created and The Review will be posted on the Agency's FaceBook page so that it is open and available to all.

Chief Polacek explained to the Board that the current cameras are outdated and are no longer supported. This purchase is part of the capital replacement schedule and includes a \$1,500 credit for cameras that will be traded in. The cameras have about a 8-10 year life span, and these cameras are the same model that are on the other engines.

Chief Polacek provided some examples of how thermal imager cameras are used i.e. inside a structure to locate heat sources such as a possible attic fire, for overhaul looking for hot spots, to determine how many passengers were in a car, or locate someone that was ejected. They have also been shared with the police department when they are on the same scene.

Individuals will be limited to speak for three (3) minutes with a total of 30 minutes allotted for Call to the Public per meeting.

Chair Pettit opened the meeting for public comments.

Chris Kuknyo, current Citizens Tax Committee President voiced concerned with the cost of PSPRS. He asked what the Board is doing about this, and asked if the Board was engaging the State. Mr. Kuknyo mentioned the words that the auditor used during the Chino Valley audit presentation and voiced his opinion that the agencies should merge. He suggested that the Board make it easy for the public to be heard and move the Call to the Public to the top of the agenda so that the public could comment on the agenda before the Board approves items. He asked that the stop watch be removed. He thanked the Board for placing Lynne LaMaster on the email list. Mr. Kuknyo voiced concern that at a previous meeting an elected official on the Board had to use Call to the Public to bring an issue forward. He recommended that the bylaws be amended to allow any two Board Members to place an issue on the agenda. He stated it was a conflict of interest for the attorney to represent all boards.

Lynne LaMaster thanked the Board of adding her to the email list, and she cautioned the Board to be really careful about putting any language regarding recurring requests in the policy manual.

Chris Jensen stated he was responding to Fire Marshal Chase's comments about Spence Springs Road. He indicated that it is a violation of fire code to have a 16' wide private road, and that due to the ongoing violation of the fire code this agency, and it's predecessor the Central Yavapai Fire District, should not have been approving new construction in this area, and stated they are building new things on Spence Springs Road all the time. He further stated that what they want the fire district to do is enforce the fire code - nothing more. He said it's not the fire district's job to tell them to donate land, that nobody wants to give up their land for free and stated it isn't the fire district's job to deal with roads, that's the responsibility of the County or the state, or maybe the private people who own the private easement. He reiterated that they just want the fire district to enforce the fire code. He stated that the issue from two years ago regarding Emmanuel Pines Camp having a rehab facility is gone now due to Obama Care no longer paying for rehab, and said this is just about two-way traffic on a 16' wide winding road that is unsafe. He stated they are having too much traffic and quite a bit of it is due to this fire district and the Central Yavapai Fire District not enforcing the fire code.

Director Zurcher asked that this item be placed on next month's agenda.





FIRE PROTECTION SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Fire Protection Agreement is made effective _____, between the Central Arizona Fire and Medical Authority, a political subdivision of the State of Arizona, hereinafter referred to as "AGENCY" and ______, hereinafter referred to as the "Applicant." The property under consideration is described as:

IT IS THEREFORE MUTUALLY UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

1) <u>Purpose</u>. AGENCY shall provide fire protection and limited emergency medical services under the terms of this Agreement.

2) <u>Duration and Renewal</u>. The effective term of this Agreement shall be from through **June 30, 2017.** The provisions of this Agreement shall renew automatically on July 1 of each year for consecutive one-year terms, unless either party pursues termination of the Agreement pursuant to Paragraph 11.

3) <u>Services Provided</u>. Fire Suppression, Emergency Rescue, and limited Emergency Medical Services (collectively "Emergency Services") will be provided under this Agreement. Unless the Incident Commander (senior AGENCY Officer present) requests additional help, AGENCY shall provide a standard response as determined by AGENCY dispatch protocols on each emergency call from the Applicant, subject to conditions below.

It is intended that the Emergency Services provided under this Agreement shall be made available to the individuals residing at the property described in the Preamble above (the "Property") or invitees of said residents (collectively, "Service Recipients") in conjunction with the above-referenced Property irrespective of whether the Property is owner-occupied or leased. While the Applicant shall be responsible for all fees assessed under this Agreement, AGENCY also reserves the right to invoice any actual Service Recipient for the services provided under this Agreement, according to the fee schedule adopted by AGENCY, as amended from time to time. Said billing shall be in addition to the service fee charged under this Agreement.

In providing services under this Agreement, AGENCY reserves the right to involve such other jurisdictions and EMS or suppression service providers as it deems necessary, consistent with its then current protocol. No assurances are made as to whether, or to what extent, any such third party providers will respond. Applicant and Service Recipients may be responsible for any additional charges assessed by such other service providers.

Applicant herein acknowledges that AGENCY alone will determine its response to any given incident and that AGENCY alone will determine the number of units and personnel responding to such incident. Applicant further acknowledges that such response is subject to, among others and without limitation, any unforeseen circumstance, a major fire, other accidents, conflicting concurrent calls, reduction in force, road closure, poor road conditions, acts of God, or other situations in which there is a shortage of manpower or equipment. Applicant understands that the response time will likely be extended beyond that which might be regularly expected elsewhere within the jurisdictional boundaries of AGENCY by reason of the distance to and isolation of the Applicant's Property, the limited manpower available, access limitations, road conditions, and the other calls within AGENCY that may take priority, and Applicant hereby consents to the same. In addition, Applicant acknowledges and agrees that AGENCY's response and effectiveness may be limited by a lack of adequate water supply.

Applicant acknowledges and agrees that AGENCY may, in its sole discretion, give priority to other emergency calls either within AGENCY's jurisdictional boundaries or outside AGENCY boundaries, potentially causing a delay in response time. Further, Applicant acknowledges and agrees that AGENCY may, in conjunction with any call to the Property, respond with insufficient equipment or manpower on occasion, either by reason of limited manpower, equipment availability, resource allocation, or by reason of the limited information having been made available to AGENCY in conjunction with the determination of the appropriate response.

Applicant hereby acknowledges that no assurances are given or warranties made as to the response time or service level that will be offered, and agrees to hold the AGENCY harmless from and indemnify AGENCY for any and all damages which might be incurred by Applicant, Service Recipient, to Applicant's Property or to any third party's property or person, including that of any Service Recipient, by reason of extended response times, reduced equipment or manpower response, the decision to involve other service providers, failure to involve other jurisdictions or service providers, AGENCY's decision to allocate resources elsewhere either inside or outside of AGENCY's jurisdictional boundaries, the allocation of manpower or equipment, or other operational decisions which might result in delay or additional loss of life or property.

Further, Applicant acknowledges and agrees that AGENCY shall not be liable for the negligent act or omission of any third party service provider. Applicant also agrees that AGENCY is under no obligation to transport any Service Recipient. Applicant acknowledges that AGENCY does not hold a Certificate of Necessity and does NOT provide ambulance or non-emergency transport services, and that transport services are typically provided through a third party. Applicant, Service Recipient, or both, shall be solely responsible for any and all expenses associated with any transport services utilized by either. 4) <u>Response Time</u>. AGENCY shall make reasonable efforts to respond to Applicant's emergency calls in a manner consistent with then-current agency protocol, subject to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Applicant hereby acknowledges that response times are subject to variations due to existing weather conditions, road conditions, travel distance, traffic conditions, property identification, conflicting responses, equipment and manpower availability or allocation, and access to Applicant's Property. Applicant acknowledges that because of the substantial distance involved, the minimum response time likely to be experienced by Applicant may exceed that of other recipients within the jurisdictional boundaries of AGENCY, and that no assurances are given by the AGENCY as to what ISO rating might apply to the Applicant's Property.

5) <u>Routing Information</u>. Applicant agrees that it shall provide AGENCY with current routing information to Applicant's Property in a form acceptable to AGENCY Fire Chief, and will endeavor to inform all occupants of subject Property of the proper procedures to follow in case of fire.

6) <u>Access</u>. Applicant hereby specifically acknowledges that standard access roads sufficient to allow AGENCY fire equipment to reach the scenes of emergency calls are a significant factor in AGENCY's ability to respond to emergency calls within a reasonable and expeditious time. If access roadways are not maintained by other public service agencies, the responsibility of providing and maintaining adequate access rests solely with Applicant. Applicant hereby agrees to hold AGENCY harmless from and to fully indemnify AGENCY for any liability or damages arising from any delay which might occur by reason of limited, inadequate or poorly maintained access, inadequate address or access description, or failure of Applicant or the Property to comply with applicable fire codes, building codes, zoning codes or recommendations or requirements made by any agency or AGENCY.

Applicant hereby grants to AGENCY the right of ingress and egress and to enter upon Applicant's Property for purposes of conducting inspections to determine accessibility, and to observe any other matters which may affect AGENCY's ability to provide services under this Agreement. Nothing herein shall be construed as requiring AGENCY to make any such inspection, or to require that AGENCY report to the Property owner in regard to any accessibility issues.

7) <u>Compensation; Calculation; Payment</u>. As consideration for AGENCY's provision of Emergency Services under this Agreement, Applicant shall pay to AGENCY a sum (the "Service Fee") equal to the amount which would be paid if the Applicant's Property was located in and taxable by the respective fire district (either the Central Yavapai Fire District or the Chino Valley Fire District) which would otherwise contract to provide such services to Applicant at that fire district's then current tax rate, any applicable bond debt servicing rates, plus an administrative fee equal to \$50.00 as modified from time to time. The Service Fee shall be owed to AGENCY by Applicant even if there is no current county tax assessed on the Property: by reason of the fact that the property is considered to be non-taxable; because no net assessed value has

been established; or for any other reason. In that event, for the purpose of calculating the Service Fee to be paid by the Applicant, 10% of the full cash value as indicated by the county assessor's office may be used as the assessed value, or if the full cash value is not available, the value of the property shall be established by way of appraisal conducted by a duly-licensed real estate appraiser provided by and solely at the cost of Applicant.

If the property is appraised, the assessed value will be 10% of the appraisal. The then current fire district tax rate shall be applied to said property value, plus any then-applicable bond debt service rates and an administrative fee equal to \$50.00. If for some reason the current assessed value information is unavailable, then the Service Fee under this contract, as renewed, will be equal to the Service Fee charged for the immediately preceding service year, plus 10%, until such time as the current property value information becomes available, at which time the fee for the then-current year shall be recalculated and an adjustment to the Service Fee made.

Payment shall be due when this Agreement is signed; alternatively, payment arrangements may be approved in the sole discretion of AGENCY for quarterly payments with the first payment being due and payable simultaneous with the execution of this Agreement and thereafter on the first day of each subsequent quarter. Any payment not received within 30 days of the due date will be considered in default and may result in the termination of this Agreement. For the initial term of the Agreement, the parties agree that the fee shall be **\$**«**F17**», but that such fee may be prorated (based on 12 months).

In the event of termination of this Agreement due to non-payment by Applicant of the agreed Service Fee within 30 days of due date, Applicant must reapply for Emergency Services pursuant to a new Agreement. In such event, the only option for payment under such new Agreement shall be for payment of all monies due in full at the time of execution of the new Agreement; other payment arrangements will only be considered upon renewal of the Agreement after completion of the initial term of the new Agreement.

The Service Fee paid to AGENCY by Applicant pursuant to this Agreement shall be considered earned by AGENCY when paid, and shall not be conditioned upon or modified by reason of the number of responses made by AGENCY to the Applicant's property during the term of this Agreement. While Applicant shall be responsible for all Service Fees assessed under this Agreement, AGENCY also reserves the right to invoice any actual Service Recipients for the services provided under this Agreement according to the then-current fee schedule adopted by AGENCY, as amended from time to time. Said invoice shall be in addition to any Service Fee due under the terms of this Agreement.

8) <u>Insurance</u>. Applicant shall provide AGENCY with a current certificate of liability and hazard insurance, together with the name and address of insurance agent, name of insurance company providing coverage, and insurance policy number.

9) <u>Waiver and Disclaimer of Liability</u>. Applicant agrees that AGENCY shall not be liable for any consequential damages to Applicant or any Service Recipient, including but not limited to any lost income or profits suffered by Applicant or any Service Recipient. In consideration of AGENCY's agreement to provide services under the terms of this Agreement, Applicant agrees to hold AGENCY harmless and hereby releases AGENCY from and indemnifies AGENCY for any and all claims, demands, liability and causes of action that may arise as a result of AGENCY providing the services described herein. Applicant specifically agrees to hold AGENCY harmless from, in addition to the foregoing, any claims, demands, liability or causes of action which might arise out of AGENCY's inability to provide, or any delay or limits in providing services, due in whole or in part to the conditions spelled out in Sections 3, 4, 5, and 6 of this Agreement.

10) <u>No Third-Party Beneficiaries.</u> This Agreement will be for the benefit of the parties named herein only and shall not be construed as having been entered into for the benefit of any third party.

11) <u>No Warranties.</u> Nothing herein shall be construed as a warranty by AGENCY against damages, whether to real property or personal property, which may result by way of fire, injury to a person, by accident or any other emergency occurring on Applicant's Property.

12) <u>Limitation of Damages.</u> In the event of breach or non-performance by AGENCY, Applicant's sole remedy shall be limited to the termination of this Agreement and refund of any unearned fees for that current contract year, the parties hereto having agreed that said fees are a reasonable amount of damages. This limitation of damages shall bind, without limitation, Service Recipients, family members, legal representatives, assigns and successors in interest of the Applicant. The waiver, hold harmless and indemnification provisions of this Agreement are for the benefit of AGENCY and shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

13) <u>Termination</u>. Either party may terminate this Agreement by thirty (30) days' written notice of termination delivered to the other party at these addresses:

For AGENCY:

For Applicant:

In the event of termination of this Agreement after the Applicant has paid the required payment due for that term, AGENCY shall return funds to the Applicant prorated on a per day basis for the period after the date of termination.

In the event Applicant sells the subject property or otherwise disposes of the same, this Agreement will terminate immediately upon notification from the Applicant of same; provided, however, that the indemnification requirements imposed on Applicant under this Agreement for incidents occurring during the term of this Agreement shall survive the termination hereof. Nothing herein shall prevent AGENCY from negotiating a new emergency services Agreement with the new owner of the subject property.

14) <u>Cancellation Due to Conflict.</u> AGENCY may cancel this Agreement pursuant to the mandates of A.R.S. §38-511.

15) <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this Agreement shall be held to be unconstitutional, invalid, or unenforceable, it shall be deemed severable; however, the remainder of the Agreement shall not be affected and shall remain in full force and effect.

16) <u>Fire Code Compliance</u>. Applicant hereby specifically acknowledges that all operations and activities, as well as new construction, and remodel of structures when applicable, will be in compliance with AGENCY's adopted Fire Code.

The undersigned warrants to AGENCY that the Applicant has the power to enter into this Agreement and that all necessary acts have been taken to enter into this Agreement.

Spence Springs Road update submitted by Fire Marshal Rick Chase

Spence Springs Road has been in existence since the late 1940's which is when the Emmanuel Pines Camp was developed. It has been a private road that has not been maintained by Yavapai County. January 2003 Emmanuel Pines Camp petitioned the County Board of Supervisors to have Spence Springs Road become a County road. The camp wanted the road to be wider and offered to cover the entire cost to bring it up to County standards. The residents along Spence Springs Road refused to allow the right of way to widen the road. Mr. Chris Jensen stated that he would sue the County if the Board approved the establishment of Spence Springs Road.

In 2003 Chief Willis with the Prescott Fire Department was in favor of widening Spence Springs Road. He stated his concern regarding the importance of getting fire trucks into the area to provide service.

The Central Yavapai Fire District was formed in 1965. The District uses the International Fire Code and local amendments. The International Fire Code is updated every 3 years. Buildings and ingress/egress routes that have been in existence prior to the updated fire code versions do not need to change every time a new version comes out unless the building changes occupancies. At that time current fire code requirements will need to be met. Central Arizona Fire and Medical does enforce the current fire code for all new construction; however, we do not issue building permits.

I met with David Williams, Yavapai County Development Services Director, on January 24th to discuss the County's stance on Spence Springs Road. He stated that since Spence Springs Road is a private road the County does not maintain it and cannot enforce the road width. The Fire Authority also cannot enforce the road width for those same reasons.







- Consider approval of lease of portions of the Prescott Rodeo Grounds (old Fairgrounds) to Prescott Frontier Days, Inc. Mr. Hunt reminded the Board that at its January 6, 2003, meeting, it had authorized moving forward with leasing certain portions of the old Fairgrounds. He said that notice of the Board's intent had been duly advertised and that it was not appropriate for the Board to consider the lease. He added that although there were no changes in the language fact that there were certain items of personal property owned by PFD on the grounds. Mr. Hunt said that if the Board approved the lease, he would work with Mr. Roberts to develop a schedule of those items to include with the lease agreement. Upon a motion by Supervisor voted unanimously to approve the lease.
 Approve a proclamation declaring March 2003 and 15.
- 3. Approve a proclamation declaring March 2003 as "Firewise Month." Prescott area resident Paul Benner, who said he was a member of the Prescott Area Wildland Urban Interface Commission told the Board that the Prescott area was facing a very serious fire threat and that he appreciated the Board declaring March as "Firewise Month." Chairman Davis said he hoped everyone would take to heart what the PAWUIC was trying to point out, because the threat of fire was greater than ever and people needed to take steps to protect residential areas. Supervisor Brownlow said he wanted to thank City of Prescott Fire Chief Darrell Willis for allowing the County to piggyback on the City's contract for tree cutting and removal. Supervisor Brownlow moved to approve the proclamation. Supervisor Street seconded the motion, which, in the absence of comments from the public, carried by unanimous vote.
- 4. Consider approval of items appearing on the Consent Agenda for Board of Supervisors and on the Consent Agenda for Special Districts. All items appearing on these consent agendas were approved by unanimous vote. Motion by Supervisor Brownlow, second by Supervisor Street. No comments from the public.

ITEM NO. 2. Resolve into the Yavapai County Board of Equalization and consider Petition for Notice of Proposed Correction for tax year 2002, Willow Creek Shopping Center, 115-09-091C, Currey & Associates.

ITEM NO. 3. Resolve into Board of Supervisors. Public Works Director Richard Straub.

- Recognition of Public Works employees Dwayne Patterson, Norbert Haese and Mark Ziem for winning Robert C. Esterbrooks awards. Mr. Straub pointed out that Yavapai County received four of the 11 awards available statewide, and that at the Board's last meeting in Cottonwood, employee Bob Tate had been recognized for winning one of the awards. The Board thanked Mr. Patterson, Mr. Haese and Mr. Ziem for their fine work.
- Request for the Board to consider accepting a petition to establish Spence Springs Road as a County highway. Mr. Straub told the Board the County had received a petition to establish a road leading to the Emmanuel Pines Camp (EPC) and that included with the petition was a proposed development agreement that would need to be considered if the Board decided to establish the road. He pointed out that Spence Springs Road was not a County maintained road, and that the only item on this day's agenda was to determine whether or not to accept the petition. Chairman Davis asked whether improving the road would require an agreement with the Forest Service for right-of-way and, if so, whether a discussion with the Forest Service had taken place. Mr. Straub said it would require an agreement but that no discussion had yet occurred. Mr. Schurr said that, legally, the request on this day was for the Board to accept the petition for establishment and that the Board could either accept it or reject it. He said that if the Board accepted the petition, the County would need to have a legal description with adequate maps in order to move forward with a public hearing on the matter. Mr. Schurr said that the owner of the camp had proposed a development agreement whereby he would pay all costs associated with the proposed improvement. He said he anticipated that if the Board established the road it would have to condemn portions of the right-of-way, and that the Board would need to consider whether the road really serves a public purpose or whether it is a private road serving a church camp. Mr. Schurr said he had some concerns about the proposal because the church camp wanted the County to pay the costs up front and then bill them. He said that because of the condemnation that would be involved, he also believed the County would have to hire another attorney just to deal with that issue, and that rather than the County paying costs he would prefer to see the camp deposit funds with the County. Chairman Davis asked Mr. Schurr if he had an idea of what the costs would be. Mr. Schurr said they would be significant, and that adjacent property owners had already stated that they would fight any condemnation action. Supervisor Brownlow asked if it would be possible to grant a variance on the width of the road. Mr.

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Straub said that could be considered. Mr. Schurr pointed out that currently the road is a private easement and that all of the right-of-way would have to be acquired in order to make any improvements. Chairman Davis asked if it would be possible for the County to do a study to determine the cost of improvements, including condemnation. Mr. Schurr said that if the Board did indeed feel that the road served a public purpose and was not just a private drive it could authorize such expenses. Supervisor Street asked what the Board's legal obligation would be if it accepted the petition on this day. Mr. Schurr responded that if the Board accepted the petition, the County Engineer would be charged with preparing the necessary maps and legal descriptions and providing notification to the public in preparation for a public hearing. Mr. Straub said he guessed it would cost \$1 million or more to bring the road up to County standard. Chairman Davis asked how the road could be improved in terms of safety standards. Mr. Schurr said right-of-way would still have to be acquired. Mr. Straub said that currently the road was only 16 feet wide and that it would have to be widened to a full width in order to allow for two-way traffic plus drainage. Supervisor Street said one of her concerns was that EPC was not the only camp in the area and that many of the camps in the Prescott area were in a similar situation. She said she understood EPC's concern, but that if the Board did it for one camp would it be willing to do the same for other camps. Supervisor Brownlow said that EPC had agreed to pay 100% of the costs and that the County would not be out any money. He said the Board had just declared March as "Firewise Month" and he asked what would happen if there was a need to get people out of the area near the camp and the Board did not do anything to help facilitate that. He said he would like to see this matter go to a hearing so that both sides could be heard. He said that the other camps were not stepping up with a million dollars, either. Mr. Schurr said that if the Board decided to accept the petition, he would like the applicant to be required to prepare any legal descriptions and maps for the public hearing. EPC attorney Clint Brown said he would like the board to accept the petition so the hearing could go forward. In response to a question from Chairman Davis, EPC Director lke Ullyot said what the camp would pay for was all spelled out in the development agreement. Chairman Davis asked whether the camp was willing to pay for any expenses incurred by the County in the event that the outcome of the public hearing was a decision by the Board to not establish the road. Mr. Brown and Mr. Ullyot said yes. Mr. Straub said that if the Board accepted the petition, staff would ask EPC to prepare the necessary descriptions under the County's direction. Supervisor Street moved to accept the petition, with a hearing date to be determined later. Supervisor Brownlow seconded the motion. Chairman Davis called for comments from the public. Jeanine Dike, representing the Arizona Pioneers' Home, told the Board the EPC served the local community and that the road was difficult to traverse. Muriel Rabideau, representing Sacred Heart Church, said she supported the establishment of the road and was concerned with fire hazard in the area. Spence Springs Road residents Richard and Peggy Christensen registered opposition to the establishment request. Scottsdale resident Adley Croaff said he was the owner of the road and that it varied in width from 16 feet to 22 feet in some places. He said this matter had been litigated in the past and that people had been told not to pursue it again. He said he would like to see the road remain as it is, and that the idea of widening it to 50 feet was unimaginable. Spence Springs Road resident and local attorney Christopher Jensen asked whether the primary concern with widening the road was really to mitigate fire hazard or whether it was to allow EPC's growth plans to move forward. He said that the camp had a history of leasing property for residential uses in order to avoid subdivision regulations, and that it was a question of whether a private business like EPC could use government to gain an advantage over competitors. Mr. Jensen asked who would be served by improving the road, saying that it would be mostly employees of EPC and the out-of-town people who use the camp. Kingswood resident Paul Benner expressed concern about the ability to get emergency vehicles in or out of the area. Rev Kimball Arnold said she lived on Spence Springs Road and that when this matter was litigated for a third time, EPC was told not to bring it back. She said that the camp had growth plans and that what most concerned her was the fact that this matter had been brought to the Board of Supervisors without the knowledge of the people who would be most affected by it. City of Prescott Fire Chief Darrell Willis said he would support at least looking at the issue because the subject area was a tragedy waiting to happen. Chairman Davis said there was a motion and a second to accept the petition and begin the investigative process with the understanding that the applicant would pay for it. Supervisor Street asked if there was a way to get from the camp across the forest to Iron Springs Road, saying she believed that possibility should be looked at. Mr. Schurr said he agreed, and that there were a number of issues that would need to be explored. Supervisor Street said that in light of the history of litigation of this matter and allegations about EPC using government to condemn property, it seemed to her that it would be a smart idea to look at obtaining access across the forest. Chairman Davis called for the

Brief Explanation of Need: Yavapai County received a petition circulated by the Emmanuel Pines Camp to establish Spence Springs Road as a county highway and a proposed Roadway Acquisition and Development Agreement. The Board of Supervisors at its February 3, 2003 meeting approved acceptance of the petition and ordered that a survey and map of the alignment be prepared with the hearing to be set by staff when the survey and map was complete. The requestor has had a general alignment map prepared and the hearing has been advertised for today at 10:30 a.m.

As the 1995 Road Ordinance States "Petitions received to have roads established as County highways for upgrades or improvement shall have their priority for improvement calculated by the County Engineer, and reviewed by the Board of Supervisors prior to their establishment. Establishment petitions will not be accepted unless there is a project scheduled in the next 24 months, or to allow maintenance of a public road constructed to County standards." This is also a request to waive that portion of Yavapai County Road Ordinance 1995.

Based on comments from the County Attorney's office and Public Works the Camp has submitted 2 Agreements for consideration. Agreement Option A addresses the road as a standard 50-foot right of way. Agreement Option B addresses a variation of rights of way width. In order to minimize the impact of right of way acquisition from the neighborhood the design engineer has proposed a 32-foot right of way corridor thought the private lands with the exception of a 60 right of way at the curve and a 50-foot right of way through the Forest Service.

Both agreements address the Camp posting a deposit for the costs.

Hearing: Consider approval of a resolution to establish Spence Springs Road as a County highway; waive establishment portion of Yavapai County Road Ordinance 1995; consider waiver of Resolution 1036 requirement for a 50-foot-wide right-of-way for a residential street to allow a 32-foot right-of-way for Spence Springs Road; and consider approval of a Roadway Acquisition and Development Agreement with Emmanuel Pines Camp. Ike Ullyot, Executive Director of Emmanuel Pines Camp, provided the Board with a brief presentation in favor of the road establishment. In addition to Mr. Ullyot, the following individuals spoke in favor of the proposed road establishment, generally citing the need for a safer road for vehicles and better access for emergencies, and safety for those staying at Emmanuel Pines Camp: Lucy Mazza; Lou Beneitone, Prescott High School; Jude DeFondi; Jeanine Dike, Arizona Pioneers' Home; Jay W. Eby; Mark Temple; P.E. Benner; Jerry Vandever; Mary Morgan Vandever; Emery Brown; Cal Cordes; Envoy Brian White, Salvation Army; Richard Basinger, Board member for Emmanuel Pines; Carol Mumford, Associate Pastor at United Methodist Church; Mike Nache; and Darrell Willis, Fire Chief for the City of Prescott. The following individuals spoke in opposition to the proposed road establishment, generally stating concerns about condemnation of private residential property to benefit only Emmanuel Pines Camp, expansion of the camp, and alternatives to making the road safer without making the entire road wider: Rev. Kimball C. Arnold; Christine Jensen; Richard Christensen; Larry McKnight; Adley Croaff; Peggy Christensen; and J. David Jennett. Following the close of the public comment portion of the hearing, the Board briefly discussed the proposal by Emmanuel Pines Camp to pay for all costs related to the potential improvement of Spence Springs Road. Supervisor Brownlow asked Dave Wilhelmsen, attorney for property owner Adley Croaff, and Clint Brown, attorney for Emmanuel Pines Camp, if they would be willing to sit down and try to mediate the issue. Both attorneys indicated that their clients were willing to do so. Supervisor Brownlow then moved to hold this item in abeyance until the meeting of August 4, 2003, in order to provide the two sides with sufficient time to work out an agreement. Supervisor Street seconded the motion, which carried by

Mr. Bourdon explained that the County had received petitions for establishment and a development agreement from Emmanuel Pines Camp. Chairman Davis said the Board had asked Public Works to put together some information regarding the feasibility, cost and impact to neighbors. Mr. Bourdon said staff had looked at the proposal and had discussed some options, one of which was to create turnouts to provide opportunities for large vehicles to pass each other. Chairman Davis asked whether part of the road was on the national forest and whether Emmanuel Pines Camp would have to apply to the Forest Service for that portion of the road. Mr. Schurr said that initially the petitions requested establishment of a 50-foot right-of-way for a public roadway. He said the applicant had prepared a development agreement providing that the County would not pay any costs toward rightof-way acquisition or improvements, and that the applicant's engineer had indicated that private properties could be saved by constructing the road to a 32-foot right-of-way instead of a 50-foot right-of-way. Mr. Schurr said that the County Engineer had reviewed the proposal of the applicant's engineer and agreed that a 32-foot right-of-way was adequate. He said that property owners adjacent to the road had declined to provide additional right-of-way for widening the road but that it was his understanding that they were willing to provide right-of-way for turnouts that would make the road safer. He said it might be possible to improve the safety of the road without making it a public roadway. Supervisor Street asked if there were significant costs involved with eminent domain actions. Mr. Schurr responded that there were. He said that appraisals would be necessary and that if the value of the property being condemned was not agreed upon by both parties the value would be set by a judge and jury. Supervisor Brownlow said he understood there were three different court cases involving the road. Mr. Schurr said there had been several court cases requesting that the court declare the road an easement by prescription and declare the width of the road. He said the road was a private road, and that to create it as a County road the County would have to acquire all of the right-of-way. Mr. Ullyot showed the Board pictures of the access to the Pine Lakes Subdivision being blocked off by a large truck, saying that people in Pine Lakes had to use Spence Springs Road as an alternate access. He said he believed that Spence Springs Road constituted a safety concern that should be addressed for the public welfare, and that a number of public officials supported improvement of the road, including Yavapai County Emergency Management Coordinator Nick Angiolillo. Mr. Ullyot said that by being proactive now, the public health, safety and welfare would be greatly improved. He told the Board that currently Spence Springs Road was only 16 feet wide and that there was a problem with large vehicles being on the road. He said there was also a problem because of deep drainage ditches adjacent to the roadway, and that vehicles had been damaged because the road was so narrow and that in some instances vehicles had not been able to proceed down the road. Mr. Ullyot said he was proposing that the road be widened in order to create a safer road, saying that it could be done at no cost to the County. He said that Mr. Croaff would be paid for his land, and that in addition to improving the road a fire

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hydrant could also be installed at the expense of Emmanuel Pines Camp. He told the Board he was not present on this day to ask for zoning changes, saying that the camp began operating on a yearround basis in 1971 and that when the County implemented zoning the camp was zoned for residential camping. Chairman Davis asked Mr. Jennett to speak, asking him if he was representing property owners opposed to the road establishment. Mr. Jennett said that if there was a safety issue, it was because of the expansion of Emmanuel Pines Camp. He said there was a question as to whether the proposed improvements would serve primarily one private property, that adjacent property owners had said they would litigate if the road was established, and that he would also sue. Mr. Jennett said he believed that Emmanuel Pines Camp had gone far past being just a residential camping area, and that the few people who lived along Spence Springs Road were opposed to establishment and improvement of the road. He said that at a previous meeting local attorney and Spence Springs Road resident Chris Jensen had pointed out that it was mostly out of town people who were served by Emmanuel Pines Camp. Chairman Davis noted that many people had requested an opportunity to speak on this day, and he asked them to be brief and to avoid redundancy. Chairman Davis told those present that, for his part, this had been a very difficult issue and that all three Board members had spent a great deal of time reviewing the request and studying the issues involved. He said he believed that a private property right was a fundamental right of Americans and that as far as he was concerned there would have to be a very compelling reason for government to condemn private property. Chairman Davis then opened the floor for public comments. Ms. Mazza said she was representing herself and co-worker Maria Moretti, and that the road had become narrower and more dangerous since fencing was installed. Mr. Beneitone said he was the football coach at Prescott High School, that his varsity team had traditionally run on Spence Springs Road, and that because of the narrowness of the road he was concerned for the safety of his students. Mr. DeFondi said he lived in Pine Lakes, that there were 300 homes in his area, and that if there was an emergency there would be problems getting out. Ms. Dike said that Emmanuel Pines Camp had been host to residents of the Arizona Pioneers' Home for many years, that people who attended the camp were members of the public, and that the road was not safe. Mr. Eby said he had retired from the Forest Service, and that widening the road could help to ensure that private property would be saved in the event of a wildfire. Mr. Temple said he was a member of a local organization that used the camp and that every year the road seemed to be more restricted. He said he hoped the Board would allow the road to be improved. Mr. Benner said he was a resident of Kingswood, and that if a wildfire started in the area of the camp there was no way to tell in which direction it would burn and that Spence Springs Road was not adequate to protect the area. Mr. Vandever said he and his wife had attended Emmanuel Pines Camp since 1952 and that the road used to be more passable. He said was very concerned for the safety of the children who attend the camp and for the elderly people who used the camp. Ms. Vandever said she had been attending the camp since 1949, and that the people who purchased land along Spence Springs Road knew that Emmanuel Pines Camp was there. She said she would like to see the road widened. Mr. Brown said he had a cabin at the camp and that the road had been a real problem since a pipe rail fence was put up along it. He said there were many people who stayed at the camp who spent money in Prescott, and that the situation with the road was a safety issue. Mr. Cordes said he supported the camp's request for widening the road, that there were semi-trucks using the road and that the road should be fixed before there were accidents and lawsuits. Mr. White said the Salvation Army had used the camp since 1974, and that in his opinion the residents living along the road were the ones who had encroached upon a road that he said was there for Emmanuel Pines Camp. He said the Salvation Army would no longer use Emmanuel Pines Camp because of the problem with the road. Mr. Basinger said the public used the camp, and that even if they did not live in Yavapai County they spent money in the Prescott area while at the camp. He said that under A.R.S. §28-6701 the Board did have the authority to establish the road, and that it could do so and improve the road at no cost to the County. Ms. Mumford said she had used Emmanuel Pines Camp many times over the years, and that the road constituted a critical highway safety issue. She said she was concerned for the safety of children at the camp, and asked the Board to consider the big picture. Mr. Nache said he had attended Emmanuel Pines Camp as a child and that when parents sent their children to the camp they assumed their children would be safe and that the road needed to be built to a reasonable standard. Rev. Arnold said she lived on Spence Springs Road, that she did not disagree that there were safety issues involved, but that she hoped Emmanuel Pines Camp would have a secondary access for emergencies and that while Spence Springs Road needed to be widened it did not need to be a superhighway. Chief Willis said he was a proponent of private property rights but that wildfire and emergencies did not care about private property rights. He said this was a critical issue and needed to be resolved, because he was certain that at some point he would not be able to get fire trucks into the area to provide services. He said that in his opinion, the road needed to be improved now. Supervisor Street asked if Spence Springs Road was the only road in the County on which emergency vehicles could not travel. Chief Willis said he had not seen a situation as severe as Spence Springs Road, that there was no secondary access to the area and that it was the most critical situation that he was aware of in the

Prescott area. Supervisor Brownlow said that much had been made of an overturned truck, but that when the Board had asked for improved access into Kingswood the property owners had said "no." He said that Kingswood had also refused to build another emergency access to the east. Chief Willis said that last week it had been determined that the road into Kingswood would be improved, and that there was now also secondary access to that area. Supervisor Brownlow said he was also aware that at one time people in Pine Lakes had wanted to get out of their area by going through Emmanuel Pines Camp but that access was blocked. Chief Willis said he knew about that access and that it would be possible to get people out that way if necessary. Supervisor Brownlow said that Emmanuel Pines Camp had its exit to the south locked off. Chief Willis said he believed the Forest Service was responsible for that gate being locked. Ms. Jensen said she and her husband had built their home on Spence Springs Road more than eight years ago, that they had three children and five dogs and that they also had concerns about being able to get out. She said the road had become more narrow and that it could use some changes, but that she did not believe this was a public issue and that the courts had said it was not a public issue. She added that she and her husband knew Emmanuel Pines Camp was there when they built, but they understood it was a residential camp and would not grow in size. Mr. Christensen said he believed the proposal by Emmanuel Pines Camp was a bribe, and that if there was really a safety issue the County would have dealt with it already. He said he believed the Board would be opening a Pandora's box if it approved establishment of the road. Mr. McKnight said he had used Mr. Croaff's property for years as a place to bring people from his organization, that he drove a bus into the area and that he had never had problems getting in or out. He said the road was in better shape than it had every been and that he agreed with Mr. Christensen that the proposal constituted a bribe. Mr. Croaff said he owned Spence Springs Road, and that much of what had been said on this day was true. He said the fence was installed to create a barrier to further encroachment on his property. He said the road was only 16 feet wide, but that that was what the courts had mandated. Mr. Croaff said the road was paved last year and was widened in some areas to about 20 feet. He said he believed there was an issue with growth, and that if the camp was growing to large then maybe it was time for them to look at another option that would be safer for people. Mr. Croaff said he was aware that years ago Central Yavapai Fire District had told Emmanuel Pines Camp that they could not expand until the road was 20 feet wide. Ms. Christensen said she believed people should be looking at alternative routes, because even if Spence Springs Road was turned into a highway there was no guarantee it would never be blocked. Mr. Jennett said he did not know whether there was any more development planned for the area, but that Kingswood already had two accesses and did not need Spence Springs Road. He said the issue was about people who lived along the road as opposed to people from out of town who were just staying at the camp. He added that an extension of Pine Lakes Road did intersect with Spence Springs Road, thereby providing another way out of the Pine Lakes Subdivision, and that more and more Emmanuel Pines Camp was becoming a commercial enterprise. At this point, Chairman Davis closed the floor to further public comment. Supervisor Brownlow said that for the Board, the decision on this matter was not emotional and that if it was an emotion decision, all three Board members would probably say "yes" to improving Spence Springs Road. He said that it came down to legal issues, and that the Board was often asked to take care of roads that are not County roads. He said the Board had received a letter from Pine Lakes in opposition to the proposed establishment, but that someone else from Pine Lakes had said the area was in favor of it. Mr. Jennett said that some of the people in Pine Lakes were improperly solicited regarding this issue and asked to sign petitions in favor, but that many of them had since signed new petitions in opposition. Supervisor Brownlow quoted from a letter from local attorney Chris Jensen, saying that Mr. Jensen had stated that he would sue the County if the Board approved the establishment of Spence Springs Road. He said he had been in contact with another attorney who had also indicated that the County could expect litigation if the road was established. Mr. Jennett said that Pine Lakes would also sue. In response to a question from Supervisor Brownlow regarding the development agreement, Mr. Schurr said the agreement stated that Emmanuel Pines Camp would provide all necessary funding, that it would pay for engineering and even handle putting a proposed project out to bid, and that it would pay for costs related to eminent domain. Chairman Davis said the Board could not waive its right to representation by the County Attorney. Supervisor Brownlow said that a few weeks ago the Board was told that the County would have no protection under the Arizona Counties Insurance Pool with regard to certain deliberate actions. Mr. Schurr said that was true, and that defending an action for inverse condemnation would not be covered by the insurance pool. He said that unless the County sued for condemnation, there would be no legal cause of action. Supervisor Brownlow said this issue was not an emotional issue for him, but that like everyone else he was also concerned about safety. He asked why the people involved in this issue could not get together and work out arrangements for a 20-foot wide road with turnouts and leave the County out of it. Mr. Schurr said he had received a letter from Mr. Jensen indicating that property owners would be willing to give right-of-way for turnouts. Chairman Davis asked if Mr. Croaff and Mr. Ullyot would be willing to try to work something out. Mr. Ullyot said he had not been able to get anywhere with

Mr. Croaff, and that there had been a neighborhood meeting to discuss the issue a couple of summers ago but nothing since then. Supervisor Brownlow asked Mr. Ullyot if he was willing to sit down today and try to mediate the issue. Mr. Ullyot said he was. Mr. Wilhlemsen, attorney for Mr. Croaff, said his client would be willing to enter into mediation as a predicate to any further proceedings by the Board. Following the motion by Supervisor Brownlow, Supervisor Street said she supported the motion to hold this item in abeyance but wanted those present to understand that mediation and negotiation were two different things. She said she had heard many times that the road could be improved at no cost to the County, but that it was not true. She said that County staff had already expended a tremendous amount of time on this issue. Chairman Davis said he felt that anytime the Board stripped the rights of a private property owner there was a great expense to all County taxpayers. Mr. Schurr said he would recommend that Emmanuel Pines Camp be directed to initiate the mediation. Mr. Jennett said he was also a property owner, that he was not willing to enter mediation and that he wanted the matter killed on this day. Mr. Brown, attorney for Emmanuel Pines Camp, said his client was certainly willing to meet and try to work something out and that he believed it might be possible to reach agreement within 30 days but that more time might be required to work out engineering issues.

Brief Explanation of Need: Yavapai County received a petition circulated by the Emmanuel Pines Camp to establish Spence Springs Road as a county highway and a proposed Roadway Acquisition and Development Agreement. The Board of Supervisors at its February 3, 2003 meeting approved acceptance of the petition and ordered that a survey and map of the alignment be prepared with the hearing to be set by staff when the survey and map was complete. The Board then held a public hearing on May 5, 2003. At that time the Board directed the Emmanuel Pines Camp to initiate mediation with the major landowner and return to the Board at a later date if the mediation was not successful. The Camp has notified the County that mediation was not successful and requested that this matter be placed back on the Board agenda. A public hearing has been advertised to discuss this matter.

As the 1995 Road Ordinance States "Petitions received to have roads established as County highways for upgrades or improvement shall have their priority for improvement calculated by the County Engineer, and reviewed by the Board of Supervisors prior to their establishment. Establishment petitions will not be accepted unless there is a project scheduled in the next 24 months, or to allow maintenance of a public road constructed to County standards." This is also a request to waive the establishment portion of Yavapai County Road Ordinance 1995.

In order to minimize the impact of right of way acquisition from the neighborhood the design engineer has proposed a 32-foot right of way corridor instead of the standard County requirement of 50 foot for a residential street.

The County Attorney's office has reviewed the Roadway Acquisition and Development Agreement and finds it acceptable to form with a couple minor revisions.

Ms. Ayers said that these changes would result in a savings but that she was requesting the Board hold approval of the Road Supervisor position. She said that an apprenticeship would instead be used to develop someone who could eventually move into the position. She added that approval of the request would result in laying off a could employee effective December 31, 2003, but that Human Resources would make every effort to help that employee find other County employment. Chairman Davis said he supported the creation of an apprenticeship program with regard to the Road Supervisor position.

ITEM NO. 6. Public Works Director Richard Straub.

- Hearing: Consider renewal of an existing water franchise with Diamond Valley Water Users. Approved by unanimous vote, with no comments from the public. Motion by Supervisor Brownlow, second by Supervisor Street.
- 2. Hearing: Consider approval of a resolution to establish Spence Springs Road as a County highway; waive establishment portion of Yavapai County Road Ordinance 1995; consider waiver of Resolution No. 1036 requirement for a 50-foot right-of-way for a residential street to allow a 32-foot right-of-way for Spence Springs Road; and consider representing Emmanuel Pines Camp, and Thomas Arnold, speaking on behalf of the property owners along Spence Springs Road, participated in discussion of this item. Attorney Ray Brown also participated, as did Deputy County unanimously to deny establishment, deny the waiver, and deny the Roadway Acquisition and Development

Chairman Davis told those present that this was actually a continuation of the hearing of May 5, 2003, at which time public comment was taken, and that the Board was not going to rehear everything it had heard in May. He said that at the end of the hearing in May, the Board had asked the two parties to get together and try to work things out and that the purpose of this day's meeting was to hear the results of that effort and that following that the Board would render its decision. He asked for comment from a representative for Emmanuel Pines Camp. Mr. Brown said that Mr. Croaff had never offered a 28-foot right-of-way but instead had offered a 20-foot right-of-way with a raised curb on his side only and that he wanted Indemnification from the camp. Mr. Brown said that Mr. Croaff's price had also continued to climb and that he was asking \$300,000 for an additional 16-foot right-of-way. He said the issue before Bailey v. City of Mesa. He said that in that case the court had raised a series of questions to help determine whether a use was public or private, and that one of the questions was whether there were public health and safety issues involved. Mr. Brown said that taking into consideration the questions in Bailey v. City of Mesa, there could be no question that the intended use of Spence Springs Road was public in nature. He said that Emmanuel Pines Camp was a 501(C)(3) organization with all of its proceeds going to charitable purposes. He said that the Board had

received many letters from adjacent neighborhoods asking that the road be widened, and that the Board had also received similar letters from many people who had used the camp. Mr. Brown said it was a safety issue, and that with the recent wildfires in California everyone was reminded that safety was a very important issue. He said that there was no private remedy to this public need, and that he was asking the Board to proceed with eminent domain. He said the camp had asked Mr. Croaff for only 16 feet of additional right-of-way when his property was 1,000 feet deep and that area property owner and attorney Christopher Jensen had suggested that instead a road through the Pine Lakes subdivision be widened in order to accommodate the camp. Mr. Brown said that Emmanuel Pines Camp had been in existence since the 1940s and that in 1989 the County had determined that the camp could have 99 dwelling units. He said that the camp had only 58 dwelling units, and that Mr. Jensen's comments about the zoning status of the camp were unfounded. Mr. Brown said that the camp's request promoted the health, safety and welfare of the general public. He said this would be a very expensive project for the camp, and that the camp would rather use its money for camp improvements instead of using it to work with the County to resolve a safety issue. Mr. Brown said that opponents would have the Board believe that this was a public taking for a private purpose, but that case law demonstrated that was not the case. He said again that he was asking the Board to approve establishment of Spence Springs Road. Mr. Arnold said he lived on Spence Springs Road and that he was present in an effort to speak as attorney Christopher Jensen would if he were here on this day instead of being in a deposition. He said he maintained that it was illegal to use eminent domain for a private purpose. He said that Emmanuel Pines Camp was asking for the road work and offering to pay for it. Mr. Arnold said he believed that Supervisor Brownlow had once sald that the only reason the Board could consider the camp's request was the fact that the camp was willing to pay for the road work. He said that in the Balley v. City of Mesa case, the court of appeals had overruled the lower court and held that the taking was unconstitutional. Mr. Arnold said that everyone should be treated equally when safety is an issue, and that instead of reducing risk approval of the camp's request would invite everyone in the County who feels they are harmed by an alleged unsafe road to request a taking. He said he believed the request was unconstitutional, and that the Arizona Constitution prohibited the taking of private property for public use except in certain circumstances. Mr. Arnold told the Board that the Emmanuel Pines road issue had been litigated several times and defeated several times, and that he believed the Board had the opportunity on this day to realize that this was not a fair taking. Chairman Davis said the Board had received opinions from attorneys on both sides of the issue and that it appeared to him that this was an issue for the courts and not for the Board of Supervisors. He noted that this issue had been in front of the court three times, and that his responsibility to Yavapai County taxpayers was to not jump onto a slippery slope that would put all of them at risk. Chairman Davis said the Board had received a letter from Prescott National Forest Supervisor Mike King indicating that the Forest Service would also like better access into the area of the camp. He said that if people wanted better access they should go and talk to the Forest Service because there was forest on both sides of the road. He said he believed that the people who were interested in pursuing this issue should go to court. Supervisor Brownlow said that Emmanuel Pines Camp had said it would pay all expenses associated with improving the road, but that he knew the Board's approval of the camp's request would trigger a lawsuit. He asked what would happen if someone won a judgment for more money than the camp could come up with. Mr. Hunt said the County would be a party to such an action and that if a judgment amounted to more than the available resources of the camp, the County would be on the hook. Mr. Schurr said that the agreement proposed by the camp did include legal fees. He said it was likely that if approved the matter would be litigated and that he could not spare an attorney from his office and would want to hire outside counsel. He added that if the County requested additional funds from the camp and the funds were not forthcoming, the County would drop litigation. Mr. Schurr told the Board that if it decided to approve the camp's request, he would like the authority to review the agreement. Supervisor Brownlow asked if anyone was willing to give land for turnouts along Spence Springs Road. Mr. Schurr said that turnouts would be a way to maintain the narrow width of the road but that apparently the idea was not satisfactory to people in the neighborhood and that if the Board wanted to consider that option it would still need to look at condemnation. Supervisor Street said this had been a difficult issue. She said she was in favor of church camps but that for her this issue was not at all about safety or about the public. She said the issue was that people were asking her to exercise the power of eminent domain, and that she did not like using eminent domain even when it was necessary for major road projects. Supervisor Street said the County's policy had been that even when it must exercise eminent domain it pays the property owner a fair market value for the property that is taken. She said the issue was not just about Emmanuel Pines Camp, that most of the camps in the County were in her district and that at one time or another nearly all of them had called her to ask if the County could help with road improvements or extend road maintenance to their camps. She said again that, for her, the most serious issue was that she was being asked to exercise the power of eminent domain in order to take private property. Attorney Ray Brown asked if it was the consensus of the Board that this would be a taking for a private use. Supervisor Street said it did not matter. Mr. Brown asked Supervisor Street if that meant she did not want to answer his question. Supervisor Street responded "no."

 Consider approval of a right-of-way and paving project for Chipmunk Road, Williamson Valley Area, at a cost of \$58,139 to be paid from HURF. Approved by unanimous vote. Motion by Supervisor Brownlow, second by Supervisor Street. No comments from the public.

Mr. Straub said that, if approved, this item would be added to the projects list for District 1, and that the County would acquire the right-of-way for back taxes. Supervisor Brownlow said he had been working on this issue for a long time, and that Public Works Right-of-Way Specialist Beth Federico had finally been able to work out all of the

The signed Petitions state:

<u>Petition of Neighbors of Emmanuel Pines Camp to</u> Central Yayapai Fire District and Yayapai County

Petition Background and Summary-Lack of Emergency Access. The only access to the Emmanuel Pines Camp is Spence Springs Road, a private easement only sixteen (16) feet wide, on a winding path, with obstacles on both sides. The CYFD Fire Code at 3.02-3 requires that "fire apparatus access roads shall be a minimum of twenty (20) feet in width . . ." Emmanuel Pines Camp is already without adequate emergency access, and any change in use at the Camp threatens to increase the danger of a forest fire disaster.

<u>Request.</u> The undersigned residents of the area around Emmanuel Pines Camp ask for government action to prevent any change in use at the Camp that may increase the danger of a forest fire and/or the ability to respond.

May 17, 2016 Letter to Central Yavapai Fire District Board of Directors

Re: Request by 523 Petitioners for Resolution of CYFD Board to Promote Fire Safety on Spence Springs Road and at Emmanuel Pines Camp.

The Central Yavapai Fire District Board of Directors is being asked by our group of 523 or more concerned residents of the subject area to take action to safeguard our local community from this long-standing fire danger situation by passing the proposed Resolution:

<u>Resolution of Central Yavapai Fire District Board of Directors ("CYFD") as to</u> <u>Restricted Access on Spence Springs Road</u>

Recitals:

- 1. Spence Springs Road provides the only right-of-way access to and from Emmanuel Pines Camp, 3000 Spence Springs Road, Prescott, Az., 86305, as well as several residential homes.
- 2. There exists a long-term access problem on Spence Springs Road, a private road with a restricted and narrow access of only 16 feet at some points, and having a winding path which has some barriers on either side of the road (walls, rocks and fences) at various points and also has limitations on visibility around some of the curves in the road.
- 3. This Spence Springs Road width is less than the CYFD Fire Code Section 3.02-3 requirement that "fire apparatus access roads shall be a minimum of twenty (20) feet in width ..."
- 4. Pursuant to the Fire Code of the Central Yavapai Fire District, Section 3.02-5, fire apparatus access roads with a width of only twenty (20) feet shall be marked with permanent "NO PARKING -- FIRE LANE -- BY ORDER OF THE FIRE MARSHAL" signs. Spence Springs Road has no such signs.
- 5. The foregoing circumstances on Spence Springs Road creates an ongoing emergency response vehicle access restriction for two-way traffic that causes a fire danger for those who rely on Spence Springs Road for their only choice for ingress and egress, including all vehicles and people at the Emmanuel Pines Camp and surrounding residential homes.

Resolution:

In light of the foregoing facts, and in order to promote the health, safety and welfare of the local community in the area near Spence Springs Road and/or Emmanuel Pines Camp, the Central Yavapai Fire District adopts the following positions and policies unless and until the restricted private right of way access problems indicated above on Spence Springs Road are resolved by either:

(1) making Spence Springs Road wide enough to conform to the requirements of Fire Code Section 3.02-3 as amended from time to time or

(2) an alternate right-of-way access conforming to the requirements of law is available to those relying only upon Spence Springs Road for access, including Emmanuel Pines Camp. May 17, 2016

2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Chairman Rutherford led the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance.

Chairman Rutherford varied the agenda.

10. NEW BUSINESS

G. Discussion Regarding Emanuel Pines Camp and Road Access

Chief Freitag stated that there was a letter provided to the Board from Lee Terry to be added to the Call to the Public.

Fire Marshal Chase explained that Attorney Jensen had contacted the Board regarding the Spence Springs Road access at the Emanuel Pines Camp. Fire Marshal Chase stated that he had heard rumors that the camp was going to be sold and used as a rehab facility. He spoke with the camp owner, and they stated that they have no plans of selling the camp. The owner was advised that if the camp turns into anything else, they will be required to meet the current fire code. Fire Marshal Chase stated that he believes the main concern is the access road. Most of the road is 16' wide and that it is

Resident (name inaudible) stated that he toured the facility about three months ago and there were people there for rehab purposes.

Paul Beck expressed concern for the large fuel source and limited resources to save Kingswood Subdivision in the event of a fire.

Joe Collings asked for a copy of Ms. Terry's letter; he was directed to contact Administration for public records.

Noel Campbell addressed the change of use. He explained that this is a church organization that can bring in people with domestic, drug abuse problems, etc. If there has been a use change, this is the time to review the property and require them to upgrade to meet fire code.

Julia Barnel stated that Wildwood Estates has become a Fire Wise Community within the last three years. She asked what the occupancy of homes in that area in 1960 when the road was developed. She asked if a second or third camp exit was required.

Marleen, resident of Pine Lakes, stated that there are over 300 homes in Pine Lakes and the main exit is Pine Lakes Drive. The alternative is Spence Road which has a locked gate. We would have to use that road in an emergency, but that probably would not work very well.

10. NEW BUSINESS

G. Discussion Regarding Emanuel Pines Camp and Road Access

Chief Freitag asked if we could pair up with Yavapai County and perform property inspections other than the annual inspection to determine if the use has changed. Fire Marshal Chase stated he would contact the County.

Fire Marshal Chase explained that the local building department and fire agency take part in the determination of the property use.

No action taken.

Chairman Rutherford recessed the meeting at 2:40 p.m.

Chairman Rutherford reconvened the meeting at 2:45 p.m.

3. PRESENTATIONS

A. Prescott Valley Town Council Report

a private road. He confirmed that the Fire District cannot force someone to modify a private road. Currently, the District cannot do anything. However, if the camp turns into anything else, current fire code will have to be met which could include the road upgrades or possibly building sprinklers depending on the occupancy. He stated that he also met with members of Yavapai County to discuss the road.

Chief Freitag stated that District employees have documented the current buildings and contents to have a reference point if changes are made.

Fire Marshal Chase stated that there are fences beside the road where it is 16' wide; therefore, it might mean that the road location will have to change to be able to have 20' road. He stated that a letter was presented to all camp owners informing them that if they sell or change occupancy that there are fire codes that they will have to meet. Fire Marshal Chase mentioned that he provided Yavapai County with the fire code road requirements in hopes that people would follow the requirements when they turn their private property into an easement. He reiterated that the code cannot be enforced.

6. CALL TO THE PUBLIC

Chairman Rutherford opened the meeting for public comments and mentioned the letter received from Lee Terry.

Hans Clugston spoke in support of resolution against any kind of change of use of Emanuel Pines. He is concerned with road access to and from this property.

JT Purvis voiced concern with 200 people in a camp with limited access. He stated that this facility was designed as a camp, not for people living there nine to ten months. He believes they are disguising the use.

Peggotty Christiansen stated that she lives on Spence Road and has experienced previous evacuations. She shared her experience with viewing a fire truck being delayed access due to the narrow road.

Attorney Chris Jensen presented a copy of 2003 Daily Courier newspaper article in which the Yavapai County Office of Emergency Management stated that they considered the widening a critical priority due to high fire risk. He is proposing that the Board take the official position that as long as there are no road improvements, the camp should be limited to the current use only.

Fire Marshal Chase reiterated that the Board cannot take actions because there has not been a change in occupancy of the camp.

Chairman Rutherford stated that this may be a County issue if they are not utilizing the camp as it is currently zoned.

Dear Mr. Jensen,

This follows your appearance at the June 21, 2016 Central Yavapai Fire District ("CYFD") open meeting, and your correspondence dated June 22, 2016 to Supervisor Rowle Simmons which was forwarded to Fire Marshall Rick Chase regarding the above-captioned matter. You raised several issues in your correspondence that we believe require this response.

The Central Arizona Fire and Medical Authority ("CAFMA") Fire Board (successor to the CYFD Fire Board) strongly disputes your allegation of "stunning inaction" simply because the CYFD Fire Board didn't do what your group advocated. It is not within the Fire Board's authority to impede the private property rights of citizens of the District without proper jurisdiction. The Fire Board is comprised of members who are all extremely active in the community- politically, socially, for business purposes, and otherwise. All of the Board members bring their respective backgrounds to bear in considering any matter before it. The Fire Board is extremely sensitive to the issue of government agency over-reaching with regard to personal and real property rights, and without proper jurisdiction, it will not act simply because it is asked.

The resolution you proposed was drafted to pre-emptively resolve that the private property owner of the Emmanuel Pines camp- which is apparently not in violation of any Fire Code section at this time- should be limited in the use and enjoyment of his or her private property, and further, that the private property owners on Spence Springs Roadwhich private road is not under the jurisdiction of the CYFD- should likewise be enjoined from the free use and enjoyment of their private property. It is the Fire Board's position that it is not appropriate for the Fire Board to make such a resolution. Further, it is clear- and was clearly stated at the meeting- that the Fire Board has no jurisdiction to enforce a change in the Fire Code on either of the entities named in your draft absent a substantive change in use at the camp or the voluntary consent of the residents of Spence Springs Road. In paragraph two of your correspondence you suggest the Central Yavapai Fire District Board's position is that its jurisdiction does not extend to alleged zoning violations; that is correct. The Fire Board's jurisdiction is over matters related to the Fire Code only. However, to be clear, the Fire Board does not claim that the issues you raised are exclusively zoning matters, it only advised that the Board has no jurisdiction over such matters. In the event of a change of use, the District has the authority to require that a property be brought up to the new Fire Code requirements. However, enforcement authority regarding such a citation lies with that county, as set forth in A.R.S. §48-805.5, in which the subject property is located.

At this time the Fire District has NO credible evidence that the camp property is being used for activities outside of its approved occupancy. At no point did any of the remarks made by any of the speakers or yourself provide clear evidence of Fire Code violations at Emmanuel Pines Camp. This will further confirm that, contrary to your allegation of CYFD's lack of response, Fire Marshall Chase and Assistant Fire Marshall Smith have worked directly with County officials to follow up regarding the camp based on the concerns raised by your group.

Fire Marshall Chase and ASM Smith have carefully documented the condition of the structures and facilities at the Emmanuel Pines Camp, by in-person visits and by photography of the facility. They have confirmed the nature and substance of the activities taking place there. As was suggested by Chief Freitag during the open meeting, FM Chase has partnered with Yavapai County to conduct spot visits at Emmanuel Pines Camp to determine whether or not the camp is in violation of its terms of approved usage. To date, no credible evidence has been presented of such violations.

Further, at Chief Freitag's instruction, FM Chase contacted Representative Noel Campbell regarding the specific allegations he raised that the camp was in violation of its usage limitations; those allegations were pursued but were ultimately determined to be unfounded. This will further confirm that FM Chase and the County will continue to monitor the camp, and if in the future the camp is found to be in violation of the Fire Code, it will be cited for such violations.

Regarding the concerns raised by the residents in the area of Spence Springs Road of the fire hazard related to access within their neighborhood for fire equipment due to the narrow road surface, this will confirm that, as was discussed during the open meeting, that road is privately owned and thus not within the jurisdiction of the Central Yavapai Fire District.

Further, the article you submitted dated from 2003 mentions that residents have built fences and walls up to the side of the road, reducing its width, as FM Chase advised, to only 16 feet. As Fire Marshall Chase discussed during his comments, and as were remarked upon by several of the public speakers- possibly signatories on the petition you mentioned during the meeting- the fire hazard is created by the narrow road, not by the camp. That same article mentioned that there have been two private lawsuits previously filed, as well as a separate County action, all presumably seeking to Christopher Jensen, Esq. resolve the access issues you raised at the meeting, and all to no avail. That article further notes your own opposition to the possible widening of the road. Interestingly, it appears that you now seek to use government power in furtherance of your own objectives- which appears to be contrary to your belief re: same as stated in that article.

FM Chase also advised during his response that the Fire Code would require, was that private road in the public domain, that it be no less than 20 feet in width. It seems apparent to this Fire Board that widening the private road would act to address the specific concerns raised by the speakers at the meeting regarding ease of access. However, at no time did any speaker ever state that he or she would be willing to give up his or her own private property to ensure compliance with the Fire Code on that private road. Additionally, your remarks to the Fire Board, and those of the other speakers, were unclear as to how the resolution you proposed would change these circumstances.


Mr. Jensen, the Fire Board is well aware of its obligations, its authority, and the full extent of its jurisdiction. It seeks the input of its professional staff and it takes their input and advice seriously. The Board strongly denies that there was any "predetermined decision" in connection with your proposed resolution. The Fire Board simply will not improperly extend its authority over a private road or over a private residence or business. Because of the legal jurisdictional issues, the Fire Board has been advised that It is likely the resolution as proposed would have been null and void. Further, the Fire Board deems that the resolution would have been an inappropriate exercise of its authority.

The CAFMA Fire Board thanks you for your attention to this matter and the obvious concern expressed by the residents and yourself at the open meeting.

Re: Access Roadway for Fire Apparatus

Dear Mr. Hodson:

In reference to your letter of January 31, 1986, the steel posts placed along the access roadway to Emmanuel Pines, which restricts the driving width to 16 feet, do present problems.

The Uniform Fire Code states in Sec. 10.207. (a) "Required Construction. Every building hereafter constructed shall be accessible to fire department apparatus by way of access roadways with all-weather driving surface of not less than 20 feet of unconstructed width,"

If a 20 foot roadway is not provided, than additional buildings cannot be constructed.

An immediate problem is access. Should another vehicle come down the roadway, during an emergency, emergency apparatus could be delayed in responding to the camp. In view of the higher risk of an incident due to the number of persons using the camp, a life safety problem could exist.

Steps should be taken as soon as possible to correct this access problem and bring the fire department access into compliance with the Fire Code.

Dear Tom:

Fire Code violations that were in existence prior to January 1, 1982, the date that Central Yavapai Fire District began enforcing the Uniform Fire Code, as adopted by the State of Arizona, may continue as long as they do not constitue a distinct life safety or property hazard.

Violations since this date are required to be corrected. Construction of buildings or additions to existing structures are required to comply with the existing edition of the fire code at the time of their construction. This compliance includes Uniform Fire Code sections 10.207, Fire Apparatus Access Roads, and 10.301, Water Supply for fire suppression operations.

As was noted in Central Yavapai Fire Districts letter of February 21, 1986, to you, the problem of the 16 foot wide access roadway limits our response capabilities to your camp. Section 10.207 of the Uniform Fire Code was quoted, referencing the required 20 foot wide driving, and it was also stated that additional buildings could not be constructed until adequate access could be provided.

The construction of the additions to the kitchen, dining hall are a violation of the Uniform Fire Code, Section 10.207 and 10.301.

All commercial construction within the jurisdiction of the Central Yavapai Fire District is to be planned reviewed by Fire Prevention. Plans for your re-model construction and addition were not submitted for plan review. The additions have increased your water requirements for fire flow to 1750 G.P.M. This requirement may be met in a number of ways, including sprinklering the building, fire hydrant installation, etc.


The violations of Sections 10.207, Fire Apparatus Access Roadways and 10.301, Water Supply must be addressed immediately.

I am available to work with you on providing an acceptable solution to these and other noted violations of the Uniform Fire Code.

This letter is in response to your request that we assess the condition of the road access to Emmanuel Pines Camp. We have conducted a review of your facility to determine what impact the condition of your access road might have in the event of an urban wildland fire or in the event we are needed on an EMS response. Generally, we concur with the opinion of Mr. Willis, Deputy Chief for the Prescott Fire Department. The roadway from Iron Springs Road is too narrow, in general, and may obstruct the flow of emergency traffic in and out of the Emmanuel Pines Camp in the event of an emergency. We recommend that you bring the road up to county standards so as to insure adequate access in the event of an emergency.

Church camp seeks county road change

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PRESCOTT – For several years, Emmanuel Pines Camp has worked to get a country road right of way widened and paved for the safety of its visitors and nearby property owners.

On Monday, the Yavapai County Board of Supervisors accepted a petition asking to designate Spence Springs Road as a county highway. The road runs about three miles, from Iron Springs Road through private and Forest Service land, to the camp.

The board must now set a public hearing date for the request.

The camp would pay the expenses for paving and improving the road, on the condition that the county maintains the road.

According to a letter from the county's Office of Emergency Management, that department, "considers the widening of the right of way to Emmanuel Pines as a critical priority," because the camp sits within the Prescott Basin in a high fire-risk area.

Prescott Fire Department Chief Darrell Willis said the present Spence Springs Road, "is a tragedy waiting to happen," because buses and emergency vehicles can't safely drive in and out.

"It's a tremendous public safety issue," Willis said.

Since the board accepted the petition, the county will need a legal description and maps before the public hearing takes place.

If the board designates the road as a county highway, it must condemn some portions of the right of way, and the board must consider whether the road serves a public purpose or is merely a private road serving a church camp.

The executive director for Emmanuel Pines Camp, Ike Ullyot, said that since the early 1900s, railroad maintenance crews as well as area ranchers have used the road.

Ullyot prepared a timeline of the road's history:

In 1947, four small churches bought the land for the camp.

· In 1962, the Croaff family purchased the 22-acre parcel Spence Springs Road traverses.

After a 1967 snowstorm and a 1983 flood took their tolls, the camp took legal action to widen the roadway.

The camp filed two more unsuccessful lawsuits before property owners built a fence and rock border that makes driving onto the shoulder of the road impossible, according to Ullyot's timeline.

Ullyot said he believes that, in an emergency, any kind of evacuation of camp visitors and nearby property owners would be nearly impossible.

And the possibility of cutting a road through forest land is not an option, he said.

"I don't believe that (option) is feasible at all. Historically ... this has been the access road," Ullyot said.

A road that cuts through virgin forest land, "would open it up to all kinds of problems," he said.

Ullyot said those problems include party-goers, illegal dumping, irresponsible target shooting and poaching.

The only possible alternative roadway is an old "narrow and dangerous" railroad that runs through the camp, Ullyot said.

The Forest Service closed that road to motorized travel, he said.

However, Ullyot said he has received 104 letters of support for the idea of the camp improving Spence Springs Road.

While the camp has not received any letters of opposition Ullyot said at least five property owners along the road don't want to see any improvements.

On Monday, members of that faction stated their opposition.

Property owner Chris Jensen voiced several concerns, including his belief that the camp wants to widen Spence Springs as part of its growth plan.

In addition, Jensen questioned how a private business such as the camp, can use government power "to gain a competitive advantage."

Jensen said that placing government in that type of position is against public policy and the county should not get involved in the precedent of giving power to a private business.

Jensen also mentioned that the camp could use the Pine Lakes access road adjacent to Spence Springs as another access route to the camp.

"We agree that the camp and the community would benefit from having better access for fire control," Jensen said, adding that the camp's proposal "would be better achieved" with another access alternative.

The Board of Supervisors met in regular session on November 3, 2003, at 9:30 a.m. Present: Chip Davis, Chairman; Gheral Brownlow, Vice Chairman; Lorna Street, Member; Bev Staddon, Clerk. Also present: Jim Holst, County Administrator; Dave Hunt, Board Attorney, Assistant County Administrator. Clerk's note: A copy of these minutes with a supplemental transcript is available in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors and is also available on the County website.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE AND FLAG FOLDING CEREMONY – Boy Scouts of America Troop 1. The young men participating in this item were Adam Schurr, Zack Schmidt and Matt Schmidt.

ITEM NO. 1. Board of Supervisors.

- 1. Resolve into the Yavapai County Board of Equalization and consider the following matters:
 - a. Petition for Notice of Claim, Raymond A. Pohl, 205-12-035K, Skull Valley area, for tax year 2002. Reference: Board of Equalization minutes.
 - b. Personal Property Petition for Review of Valuation, Ed and Steve Katz, Tax ID #6698553-016, Prescott area, for tax year 2003. Reference: Board of Equalization minutes.
- Resolve into Board of Supervisors. Consider approval of an amendment to the five-year Yavapai County Workforce Investment Plan. NACOG Regional Director Teri Drew presented this item. Approved by unanimous vote. Motion by Supervisor Street, second by Supervisor Brownlow. No comments from the public.

Ms. Drew explained that the state had recommended amendment of the five-year plan primarily with regard to eligibility but that another important change was related to the chairmanship of the Youth Council and that the amendment would allow that position to be filled by either a private sector person or a public sector person. She said that the required public hearing on this matter had been held on September 25, 2003, and that there were no public comments.

3. Discussion of the bark beetle tree removal program. Development Services Director Ken Spedding, Public Works Director Richard Straub, and Prescott Fire Department Employee Brian P. Melton participated in discussion of this item. The Board took no action, but there appeared to be general agreement to extend the program for a couple more months.

Mr. Holst said that since the implementation of the program 3,490 trees had been removed from private properties in the unincorporated areas of the County. He said that the agreement with the City of Prescott was revised and that as of October 15, 2003, the County had taken over handling what was left in the unincorporated areas. Chairman Davis asked if Jade Services was asking for more money. Mr. Holst said that the cost would probably not change provided that the services could be provided in concentrated areas. He added that there had been very few calls or letters from people wanting to see the program extended. Mr. Spedding said that his department had received a number of calls related to dead trees on private property and that his staff had told property owners that they could either sign up for the County's tree-cutting program or that the matter would be pursued through the ordinance. He said that over the last few weeks, most likely as a result of the fires in California, calls had increased and that at the present time there were approximately 20 properties in violation and that all of them were in concentrated areas. He said that if the Board did not keep the program, then his staff would have no choice but to pursue getting the properties cleaned up under the ordinance. Mr. Spedding said that an additional three months for the program would be very helpful. Supervisor Brownlow asked what the program had cost the County. Mr. Holst said the cost was \$42,000 but that it was money that was transferred from the General Fund to HURF. Mr. Straub said he had ten temporary employees and one permanent employee handling the program and that it would take about another two months just to finish the work that was already there. He added that there were still some dead trees in the County right-of-way that needed to be taken out. He told the Board he would like to continue with the slash program, saying he believed that with the onset of cold weather more people would be working on clearing brush. Mr. Melton said that in the last two months the City of Prescott had received about 50 calls, with about 30 people signing up for tree removal for a total of about

100 trees. Supervisor Brownlow said he was in favor of extending the program.

- 4. Consider approving a letter to Senator John McCain regarding the Water Advisory Committee and other Yavapai County boards, commissions and committees. Approved by unanimous vote. Motion by Supervisor Brownlow, second by Supervisor Street. No comments from the public.
- 5. Resolve into the Board of Supervisors. Consider approval of items appearing on the Consent Agenda for Board of Supervisors and on the Consent Agenda for Special Districts. All items were approved by unanimous vote. Motion by Supervisor Brownlow, second by Supervisor Street. No comments from the public.

ITEM NO. 2. Local Workforce Investment Board member Don Troutman. Present award to NACOG Regional Director Teri Drew. Mr. Troutman presented Ms. Drew with a check in the amount of \$3,300 which Ms. Drew said would be used for the benefit of helping Yavapai County residents gain employment.

ITEM NO. 3. Development Services Director Ken Spedding. Special recognition of Michael Young, who has successfully received professional certification for Residential Electrical Inspector.

ITEM NO. 4. Resolve into the Board of Directors of the Yavapai County Flood Control District. Discussion and possible action regarding the results of the Asset Management Study of 82 parcels of land (County-wide) owned by the Flood Control District. Reference: Flood Control District minutes.

ITEM NO. 5. Resolve into Board of Supervisors. Human Resources Director Julie Ayers.

Approved by unanimous vote. Motion by Supervisor Street, second by Supervisor Brownlow. No comments from the public.

Consider making the following changes to the approved staffing of the Public Works Department, effective December 31, 2003: Delete a Survey Party Chief position, Range 64; delete a Secretary Journey position, Range 58; delete a Solid Waste Field Operator position, Range 61; add an Equipment Operator I position, Range 58; add a Lead Party Chief position (new position to compensation program recommended to be placed in Range 63, at-will and exempt); and add a Road Construction Supervisor position, Range 63. Also consider changing the job title of Regional Roads Director to Assistant Public Works Director, effective November 3, 2003, with no change to range or pay of incumbent. Ms. Ayers said that these changes would result in a savings but that she was requesting the Board hold approval of the Road Supervisor position. She said that an apprenticeship would instead be used to develop someone who could eventually move into the position. She added that approval of the request would result in laying off a classified employee effective December 31, 2003, but that Human Resources would make every effort to help that employee find other County employment. Chairman Davis said he supported the creation of an apprenticeship program with regard to the Road Supervisor position.

ITEM NO. 6. Public Works Director Richard Straub.

- 1. Hearing: Consider renewal of an existing water franchise with Diamond Valley Water Users. Approved by unanimous vote, with no comments from the public. Motion by Supervisor Brownlow, second by Supervisor Street.
- 2. Hearing: Consider approval of a resolution to establish Spence Springs Road as a County highway; waive establishment portion of Yavapai County Road Ordinance 1995; consider waiver of Resolution No. 1036 requirement for a 50-foot right-of-way for a residential street to allow a 32-foot right-of-way for Spence Springs Road; and consider approving a Roadway Acquisition and Development Agreement with Emmanuel Pines Camp. Attorney Clint Brown, representing Emmanuel Pines Camp, and Thomas Arnold, speaking on behalf of the property owners along Spence Springs Road, participated in discussion of this item. Attorney Ray Brown also participated, as did Deputy County Attorney Randy Schurr. Upon a motion by Chairman Davis, seconded by Supervisor Brownlow, the Board voted unanimously to deny establishment, deny the waiver, and deny the Roadway Acquisition and Development Agreement.

Chairman Davis told those present that this was actually a continuation of the hearing of May 5, 2003, at which time public comment was taken, and that the Board was not going to rehear everything it had heard in May. He said that at the end of the hearing in May, the Board had asked the two parties to get together and try to work things out and that the purpose of this day's meeting was to hear the results of that effort and that following that the Board would render its decision. He asked for comment from a representative for Emmanuel Pines Camp. Mr. Brown said that Mr. Croaff had never offered a 28-foot right-of-way but

instead had offered a 20-foot right-of-way with a raised curb on his side only and that he wanted i<mark>ndemnification from the camp.</mark> Mr. Brown said that Mr. Croaff's price had also continued to climb and that he was asking \$300,000 for an additional 16-foot right-of-way. He said the issue before the Board on this day was one of public versus private use, and that this issue had been recently discussed in Bailey v. City of Mesa. He said that in that case the court had raised a series of questions to help determine whether a use was public or private, and that one of the questions was whether there were public health and safety issues involved. Mr. Brown said that taking into consideration the questions in Bailey v. City of Mesa, there could be no question that the intended use of Spence Springs Road was public in nature. He said that Emmanuel Pines Camp was a 501(C)(3) organization with all of its proceeds going to charitable purposes. He said that the Board had received many letters from adjacent neighborhoods asking that the road be widened, and that the Board had also received similar letters from many people who had used the camp. Mr. Brown said it was a safety issue, and that with the recent wildfires in California everyone was reminded that safety was a very important issue. He said that there was no private remedy to this public need, and that he was asking the Board to proceed with eminent domain. He said the camp had asked Mr. Croaff for only 16 feet of additional right-of-way when his property was 1,000 feet deep and that area property owner and attorney Christopher Jensen had suggested that instead a road through the Pine Lakes subdivision be widened in order to accommodate the camp. Mr. Brown said that Emmanuel Pines Camp had been in existence since the 1940s and that in 1989 the County had determined that the camp could have 99 dwelling units. He said that the camp had only 58 dwelling units, and that Mr. Jensen's comments about the zoning status of the camp were unfounded. Mr. Brown said that the camp's request promoted the health, safety and welfare of the general public. He said this would be a very expensive project for the camp, and that the camp would rather use its money for camp improvements instead of using it to work with the County to resolve a safety issue. Mr. Brown said that opponents would have the Board believe that this was a public taking for a private purpose, but that case law demonstrated that was not the case. He said again that he was asking the Board to approve establishment of Spence Springs Road. Mr. Arnold said he lived on Spence Springs Road and that he was present in an effort to speak as attorney Christopher Jensen would if he were here on this day instead of being in a deposition. He said he maintained that it was illegal to use eminent domain for a private purpose. He said that Emmanuel Pines Camp was asking for the road work and offering to pay for it. Mr. Arnold said he believed that Supervisor Brownlow had once said that the only reason the Board could consider the camp's request was the fact that the camp was willing to pay for the road work. He said that in the Bailey v. City of Mesa case, the court of appeals had overruled the lower court and held that the taking was unconstitutional. Mr. Arnold said that everyone should be treated equally when safety is an issue, and that instead of reducing risk approval of the camp's request would invite everyone in the County who feels they are harmed by an alleged unsafe road to request a taking. He said <mark>he</mark> believed the request was unconstitutional, and that the Arizona Constitution prohibited the taking of private property for public use except in certain circumstances. Mr. Arnold told the Board that the Emmanuel Pines r<mark>oad issue had been litigated several times and defeated several time</mark>s, and that he believed the Board had the opportunity on this day to realize that this was not a fair taking. Chairman Davis said the Board had received opinions from attorneys on both sides of the issue and that it appeared to him that this was an issue for the courts and not for the Board of Supervisors. He noted that this issue had been in front of the court three times, and that his responsibility to Yavapai County taxpayers was to not jump onto a slippery slope that would put all of them at risk. Chairman Davis said the Board had received a letter from Prescott National Forest Supervisor Mike King indicating that the Forest Service would also like better access into the area of the camp. He said that if people wanted better access they should go and talk to the Forest Service because there was forest on both sides of the road. He said he believed that the people who were interested in pursuing this issue should go to court. Supervisor Brownlow said that Emmanuel Pines Camp had said it would pay all expenses associated with improving the road, but that he knew the Board's approval of the camp's request would trigger a lawsuit. He asked what would happen if someone won a j<mark>udgment for more money than the camp could come up with</mark>. Mr. Hunt said the County would be a party to such an action and that if a judgment amounted to more than the available resources of the camp, the County would be on the hook. Mr. Schurr said that the agreement proposed by the camp did include legal fees. He said it was likely that if approved the matter would be litigated and that he could not spare an attorney from his office and would want to hire outside counsel. He added that if the County requested additional funds from the camp and the funds were not forthcoming, the County would drop litigation. Mr. Schurr told the Board that if it decided to approve the camp's request, he would like the authority to review the agreement. Supervisor Brownlow asked if anyone was willing to give land for turnouts along Spence Springs Road. Mr. Schurr said that turnouts would be a way to maintain the narrow width of the road but that apparently the idea was not satisfactory to people in the neighborhood and that if the Board wanted to consider that option it would still need to look at condemnation. Supervisor Street said this had been a difficult issue. She said she was in favor of church camps but that for her this issue was not at all about

safety or about the public. She said the issue was that people were asking her to exercise the power of eminent domain, and that she did not like using eminent domain even when it was necessary for major road projects. Supervisor Street said the County's policy had been that even when it must exercise eminent domain it pays the property owner a fair market value for the property that is taken. She said the issue was not just about Emmanuel Pines Camp, that most of the camps in the County were in her district and that at one time or another nearly all of them had called her to ask if the County could help with road improvements or extend road maintenance to their camps. She said again that, for her, the most serious issue was that she was being asked to exercise the power of eminent domain in order to take private property. Attorney Ray Brown asked if it was the consensus of the Board that this would be a taking for a private use. Supervisor Street said it did not matter. Mr. Brown asked Supervisor Street if that meant she did not want to answer his question. Supervisor Street responded "no."

3. Consider approval of a right-of-way and paving project for Chipmunk Road, Williamson Valley Area, at a cost of \$58,139 to be paid from HURF. Approved by unanimous vote. Motion by Supervisor Brownlow, second by Supervisor Street. No comments from the public.

Mr. Straub said that, if approved, this item would be added to the projects list for District 1, and that the County would acquire the right-of-way for back taxes. Supervisor Brownlow said he had been working on this issue for a long time, and that Public Works Right-of-Way Specialist Beth Federico had finally been able to work out all of the right-of-way issues. He added that he believed this was one of the last dirt roads in that area.

- 4. Consider approval of a Contract and Authorization of Services No. 2313424 with Project Engineering Consultants, Ltd. for professional engineering services on the Black Canyon City Drainage Improvement (Phase II) & Overlay Project in an amount not to exceed \$89,118. Half-cent sales tax project. Development Services Director Ken Spedding participated in discussion of this item. Approved by unanimous vote. Motion by Supervisor Brownlow, second by Supervisor Street. No comments from the public.
- 5. Consider approval of ADOT Aeronautics grant E4S24 in the amount of \$18,000 for upgrades and modifications to the wind indicators at the Bagdad Airport, with County match of \$2,000 to be requested from the 2004-2005 fiscal year budget (Outside Services, General Services Airport account). Approved by unanimous vote. Motion by Supervisor Street, second by Supervisor Brownlow. No comments from the public.
- 6. Discussion and possible direction regarding the reinstatement of the Local Transportation Assistance Funding Program (LTAF II). Transportation Planning Engineer Mike Willett presented this item. Upon a motion by Supervisor Brownlow, seconded by Supervisor Street, the Board voted unanimously to authorize applying for funding.

Mr. Willett told the Board that for 2004 the County could receive \$102,914 in LTAF money and that this was \$10,000 more than the County had received last year. Chairman Davis said no one knew whether the LTAF program would continue to receive funding or whether this was just a one-time shot. In response to a question from Chairman Davis about how the funds could be used, Mr. Willett said they could only be used for public transit. Chairman Davis said that the state had recently adopted a state-wide bicycle plan and that he was wondering whether the LTAF money could be used to develop a Yavapai County bicycle plan. Mr. Willett said he believed the funds could be used for that purpose, but that the intent of the program was to provide transportation for people who do not otherwise have it. He noted that one difference between the 2004 funding and last year's funding was that the County would be required to enter into a contract with the proposed operators. He asked if the Board wanted him to go ahead and apply for the funding. Supervisor Street said the Board to consider using some of the funding to replace the \$60,000 the Board had put into the budget under General Services for public transit programs. Supervisor Brownlow suggested getting the money first, and then putting strings on it. Mr. Willett said there had been positive feedback on previous projects funded through LTAF, particularly projects that allowed for the purchase of vans for organizations.

7. Consider approval of items appearing on the Consent Agenda for Public Works. Unless otherwise noted, all items were approved by unanimous vote. Motion by Supervisor Street, second by Supervisor Brownlow. No comments from the public.

Upon any change or expansion of use, permits shall be required. The permitting process shall include review and approval of the Central Arizona Fire and Medical Authority. In reviewing the Authority's codes and meeting with staff from the Authority it is apparent that any expansion or change of use would compel the applicant to address the substandard access to the property. The inability to demonstrate adequate access may preclude issuance approval from the authority, thus resulting in denial of additional uses until such deficiencies can be corrected.



Plaintiff and Defendant entered into a stipulation for dismissal with prejudice and the lawsuit was dismissed. The Plaintiff has filed this lawsuit to declare a private way of necessity.

In this lawsuit, the Plaintiff argues that the conditions are different than they were at the time of dismissal of the prior lawsuit and that facts now exist which make the easement inadequate and that new circumstances are present which call for a relitigation of the question. Plaintiff alleges as new circumstances that the Defendant has erected steel posts along the boundaries of the right of way and easement, a condition unanticipated, preventing proper use of the easement and that emergency vehicles cannot gain adequate access to the property.

The Defendant responds by filing the affidavit of Charles H. Craig, Fire Marshall of Central Yavapai Fire District, that the circumstances existing in 1984 are the same as now. The Defendant also points out that the width of the samement was an issue in the prior suit and that adequacy was anticipated at that time. Defendant believes that the prior judgment of dismissal with prejudice is conclusive and that the easement and right of way previously granted cannot be again adjudicated.

The doctrine of res judicata is set forth in the authorites cited in the Defendant's brief. The Arizona Court of Appeals in <u>DiOrio v. Scottsdale</u>, 2 AzApp 329, 408 P2d 849 (1965) stated at page 330:

> "The doctrine of res judicata binds the same parties standing in the same capacity in the subsequent litigation on the same cause of action, not only upon the facts actually litigated, but also upon those points which might have been (even though not expressly) litigated."

The previous lawsuit, Yavapai Cause No. 38833, litigated the issue of condemnation of a private way of necessity and the subsequent stipulated judgment resolved this issue in favor of the Plaintiff and the lawsuit was dismissed with prejudice for the reason that all matters, issues and claims set forth had been fully compromised and settled. This lawsuit was filed to declare a private way of necessity over the Defendant's property:

The Plaintiff's argument is without merit and without basis in fact. It is certainly to be expected that the right of way would be fenced. It is unreasonable to believe that the right of way would not be fenced with steel posts of otherwise. The right of way exists as it did at the time the previous case was dismissed. No facts exist which change or alter this conclusion.

No controverting facts are present which would lead to the conclusion that emergency vehicles have any different access to the HEARING ON: 47743 ARIZ. DIST. CONF. VS. CROAFF

to the property than before. Therefore, ho unforesten condition or circumstance has occurred or might occur which would permit this case to be relitigated.

The Plaintiff is bound by the stipulated judgment in 1984 and there are no facts which would entice the Plaintiff to reopen or relitigate the case. The Defendant is entitled to rely on the prior judgment of dismissal with prejudice. The Defendant's motion for summary judgment on the res judicata issue is granted.

CENTRAL ARIZONA FIRE AND MEDICAL AUTHORITY

THIS CENTRAL ARIZONA FIRE AND MEDICAL AUTHORITY AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered into this $\frac{5^{H}}{2}$ day of <u>Ocholase</u>, 2015, by and among THE CENTRAL YAVAPAI FIRE DISTRICT ("CYFD") and THE CHINO VALLEY FIRE DISTRICT ("CVFD"), both of which are special taxing districts and political subdivisions of the State of Arizona, operating pursuant to Chapter 5, Title 48 of the Arizona Revised Statutes (each individually a "Party" and together, the "Parties").

RECITALS

A. The Parties are both fire protection districts located within Yavapai County, and each is authorized to provide and providing fire protection and emergency medical and rescue services, enforcement of fire prevention codes, hazardous materials response, and other emergency services authorized by statute and typically provided by a public fire department.

B. Arizona Revised Statute §48-805.B.16 authorizes the parties to enter into intergovernmental agreements for the joint and cooperative provision of services as outlined above.

C. A.R.S. §48-805.01 authorizes public agencies like the parties to cooperate and contract with one another to create a separate legal entity to provide any function, service, or facility lawfully authorized to each, and to establish the separate legal entity to do so.

D. The Parties have previously entered into numerous contractual agreements and cooperative arrangements to jointly provide public services, including, but not limited to the Joint Management Agreement dated 19 June, 2014, the Chief's Services contract, the Fire Inspector Services contract, the Fleet Maintenance Services contract, the Automatic and Mutual Aid Agreements between them, and others.

E. The Parties, because of their long standing, effective, and efficient cooperative arrangements to jointly provide public services, desired to evaluate the public benefits of more fully integrating their services. They therefore began the process of analyzing a possible merger or consolidation of the parties' services or the creation of a new joint powers authority to provide such services. That analysis culminated in the June 2015 White Paper submitted to the respective elected Fire Boards of the parties. The White Paper details that a merger of the Parties into a single fire protection district is not feasible at this time, but that the creation of a joint powers authority is operationally and financially feasible.
