

Dear Citizens of Eagar,



I was speaking with Director Packard on Wednesday. She said we need something to unite our country again. Unfortunately, it usually takes some type of tragedy to pull us all together. I think unifying our country right now means that we pull together, stand up, and say NO – we demand better! By better, I mean better from our elected officials who seem to be spiraling with no clear direction or understanding. I am thankful I do not live in Minneapolis or Seattle right now, just to name a couple of places.

Getting through what our nation is facing today is going to take strength of character and a willingness to persevere in the face of adversity. We as American citizens have that strength, and we have the ability as long as we do not allow things to continue as they are.

Our flag, our anthem, the Declaration of Independence, Bill of Rights, and Constitution unite us as one. We are an imperfect union created by imperfect people and populated by imperfect human beings. We have realized great success, have been impacted by terrible tragedies, and many in our history have suffered through injustice. This does not mean we are all bad, it means there are some bad people in our world, and that our history is not unblemished. That said, you can't erase the past. As Winston Churchill once said, "Those who forget history are doomed to repeat it." The idea that erasing history by destroying our country will make people feel better about themselves is - well - asinine.

To me, freedom means the ability to move, speak, live, ask questions, and decide for myself. This freedom was written in ink, and earned through sacrifice. If we look back through history, great men and women of all backgrounds, races, creeds, and religions have fought to create and maintain our way of life. Each time we have given up some small piece, it has had an impact on our lives. Think of the boiling frog analogy. Put a frog in boiling water and it jumps out. Put a frog in cool water and slowly turn up the heat, it will not perceive the danger and will slowly die. Look around you to get a sense of what is happening right now.

By a show of hands, how many have read the Allegory of the Cave written by Greek Philosopher Plato? If you have not read it and had a chance to discuss its deeper meaning, you should. I believe that in many ways the Allegory of the Cave is illustrative of our current situation. In the writing, prisoners have been chained facing a wall since childhood. People on a raised walkway behind the prisoners use puppets to create shadows projected on the wall by the fire that burns behind them. The sounds they make echo off the walls making it seem as if the sounds are from the shadows themselves. The prisoners' reality is only what is on the wall in front of them; they have no knowledge of the people behind them.

After setting the stage, Plato supposes one prisoner is freed. When he turns to the light, he cannot see as his eyes are not used to light. He sees outlines but cannot clearly see or understand what is before him. The prisoner is then forced from the cave and into the sunlight. Eventually, he can see the moon, stars, and light shimmering off the lake. His eyes have now adjusted to the sunlight and he can see the truth. He returns to the cave to share what he has seen with his fellow prisoners, but because his eyes have adjusted to the light, he cannot see in the darkness. Plato infers that the remaining prisoners

believe his blindness was caused by his journey into the light. They would then refuse to take the same journey, and if they could, they would kill anyone that tried to drag them out of the cave.

Over time, like the frog in the boiling water, we have allowed ourselves to be shackled in a cave by our media, social media, and some elected officials. When someone tries to drag us out and show us the truth, we lash out irrationally refusing to even have a dialogue about reality. We've become accustomed to watching the shadows projected on our television screens, computers, and phones by puppeteers using their powers of persuasion to create an alternate version of reality or alternate narrative. Some in our society have become so invested in the shadow of reality that they react in vile and violent ways against those with an alternate viewpoint. It's as if it has become a crime against humanity to have a differing opinion. Comply or else!!

Putting it in modern terms, we are becoming the slaves chained in the cave by our addiction to social media, 24-hour news cycles, and politicians who require compliance without question. Our fellow prisoners i.e. citizens have been reduced to blind followers unwilling or unable to seek clarity of vision. Elected officials, the media, and special interests are those hiding behind the wall making the shadow puppets that we are supposed to accept as our reality. Deviate from the accepted narrative, and find yourself figuratively and in some cases literally beaten for not following the herd.

The result is an unhealthy division, an inability to have civil discourse, elected officials run amuck because we are not holding them accountable, and brave social media warriors hidden behind computer screens without fear of reprisal. The vitriol in which people are attacking each other is sickening as is the idea that compliance is a virtue.

The freedom we enjoy in America means that we do not have to be and should not be shackled in a cave and manipulated by others. We have the freedom to seek the truth and we have the freedom to have a dialogue and civil discourse. Others have sacrificed greatly so that we can enjoy these freedoms.

We have the freedom of movement, to travel and enjoy the great beauty our country has to offer. We have the freedom to own and operate businesses, and we have the freedom to patronize those businesses – including gyms, bars, and restaurants when we want and how we want. Just as those individual private businesses have the right to require masks without having to debate with me. We have the freedom to share our views and the government or others should not persecute us for exercising that freedom – freedom of speech is not a one way constitutional right.
